#### **PURPOSE STATEMENT – Community Corrections Partnership**

The mission of the Community Corrections Partnership (CCP) is to discuss issues related to the implementation of various pieces of state legislation that focus on adult criminal offenders, including the realignment of many state public safety functions to local jurisdictions. The overall objective is to reduce the recidivism rate of adult offenders in the local criminal justice system.

Membership of the CCP is outlined in California Penal Code section 1230 and defined by the Community Corrections Performance Incentive Act of 2009 (SB 678) and includes the Chief Probation Officer (Chair)\*, Presiding Judge of the Superior Court\* or his or her designee, a County Supervisor or County Administrator, District Attorney\*, Public Defender\*, Sheriff\*, the head of the Department of Social Services\*, the head of the County Department of Mental Health, the head of the County Department of Employment, the head of the County Alcohol and Substance Abuse programs, the County Superintendent of Education, a local chief of police\*, a representative of a community-based organization with experience in successfully providing rehabilitative services to persons convicted of criminal offenses, and an individual who represents the interests of victims.

Through AB 109/AB117 the CCP is responsible for recommending a local plan to the county Board of Supervisors (BOS) for the implementation of public safety realignment. This legislation also established an Executive Committee within the CCP. Each Executive Committee member is identified with an asterisk (\*) above. The Executive Committee is responsible for approving the local plan for recommendation to the BOS.

### Community Corrections Partnership Meeting Public Safety Local Plan Development Minutes September 24, 2015

Chief Hansen welcomed everyone, thanked them for coming and asked the members and audience to do a quick introduction.

### **Approval of Agenda**

The motion of Lesli Caldwell to approve the Agenda was adopted by the following vote: 8 in favor, 0 (zero) opposing and 0 (zero) abstaining.

**Public Comment:** Deanna Allen was very proud to announce that the WRAP program will be awarded a commendation from the States Attorney General's Office for recidivism reduction. Due to California's recent wild fires the award ceremony has been postponed until 2016.

Raymond Courtemanche took this opportunity to thank the committee for the continued partnership with Mission Solano.

### **Approval of Minutes**

The motion of Judge Nelson to approve the Minutes was adopted by the following vote: 7 in favor, 0 (zero) opposing, and 1 (one) abstention by Judge Nelson.

- Dr. Johnson presented statistical information pertaining to the Realignment population.
- Lieutenant Mashburn provided statistical information pertaining to the jail population as a result of Public Safety Realignment.
- Mr. Simmons presented statistical information regarding referrals and placements for AB109 offenders.

**Public Comments Regarding the Data Report:** Dr. Schussel expressed his concerns about the data report. He feels the slides are of limited value to the public and do not show the information that is desired.

### <u>Pretrial Presentation:</u> (See PowerPoint-Pretrial Services Program)

Probation Services Manager, Ms. Potter gave a presentation regarding the Pretrial program. Pretrial Services program launched March 12, 2015. Clients that meet eligibility per the Pretrial policy are interviewed and assessed for risk using Ohio Risk Assessment Systems tool (ORAS) which measures risk to recidivate. In addition to assessing for risk, staff prepares a report to aid the Court in making informed decisions.

From 3/12/2015 to 8/31/2015, 48 defendants have been granted release on Pretrial Services.

Public Defender Caldwell asked for additional statistical information which was provided and will be expanded upon during future meetings.

LCA Presentation: (See PowerPoint-Leaders in Community Alternatives (LCA)

Ms. Massa from LCA presented the committee with information regarding the Job Readiness

Program. She shared various client demographics that factor into the outcomes of the Job

Readiness Program as well as gave a list of current and prospective partners and employers.

She also shared information detailing the In-Custody Services they provide for both pre-release and post-release and gave stats and additional data regarding the services.

**Public Comment Regarding the LCA Presentation:** Dr. Schussel inquired how many clients have been able to hold a job for 3 months after successfully completing the program, what % have a high school diploma or GED, how many are in jobs where they are making a living wage. Ms. Massa was able to provide Dr. Schussel with the information he requested.

**BSCC Community Recidivism Reduction Grant:** The committee received a recommendation from the Ad Hoc subcommittee for awarding the BSCC Community Recidivism Reduction Grant in the amount of \$75,000 (three \$25,000 awards; Mission Solano, Michael's Transportation, and Mount Calvary Baptist Church) and was asked to approve the recommendation submitted as well as task the AD Hoc subcommittee with awarding the remaining \$25,000. In addition, the Ad Hoc subcommittee was tasked with making a recommendation for the FY15/16 grant of \$50,000.

**Public Comment Regarding the BSCC Community Recidivism Reduction Grant:** No Public Comment

The motion of Sheriff Ferrara to approve the recommendation was adopted by the following vote: 8 in favor, 0 (zero) opposing, 0 (zero) abstaining.


# Realignment Recidivism- Year 1



### (10/1/11-9/30/12)

### **First Year Conviction Rate**

- ➤ 19% of the PRCS released during the first year of realignment (10/1/2011-9/30/2012) were convicted of a misdemeanor or felony in Solano County within one year of release. This is similar to the average 22% first-year reconviction rate published by CDCR between 2003-2010 (statewide data).
- Of the 16 individuals released on mandatory supervision (1170h) during the first year of realignment (10/1/2011-9/30/2012), 2 were convicted of a misdemeanor or felony in Solano County, 1 within the first year.




## Solano County Split Sentences



## **Pretrial Program: Overview**



### Big picture

- Program is being implemented in phases, and expanding gradually with dual goals- to maintain public safety and reduce jail costs
- Implementation of MIOCR funded jail diversion program for Mentally III Offenders.
- Potential use of Non-Interview Tool.

### > Financial Impact

- Since implementation in March 2015, 130 individuals have been released from custody based on the recommendation of the Pretrial program, resulting in a cost savings of \$148 per inmate per day.
  - > 47 have been released on their Own Recognizance (OR)
  - ➤ 83 individuals have been granted release under Pretrial services.



### Percentage of Jail Population & Population Trends









# Health & Social Services (HSS) Mental Health Services



- Integrated Care Clinics (ICC) provide initial mental health assessments and ongoing psychiatry services including monitoring medication, crisis intervention as needed, and light case management. The target population is Seriously Mentally III (SMI) adults who are appropriate for medication monitoring services. ICC sites are located in Fairfield, Vallejo and Vacaville.
- **Non-Forensic Mental Health** services may include private providers from the network of care, Full Services Partnerships (FSP) programs, or Case Management Programs.
- Forensic Assertive Community Treatment (FACT) is a Full Service Partnership (FSP) Program specializing in the provision of intensive mental health services to Seriously Mentally III (SMI) offenders. Services include intensive case management, individual and group therapy, psychiatry and medication monitoring, individual rehab, and crisis intervention as needed. FACT works closely with Probation and the Courts to monitor clients' progress.
- **Exodus Crisis Stabilization Unit (CSU)** provides crisis intervention for clients in acute crisis requiring further assessment for hospitalization. Additionally the CSU currently provides urgent medication refill services for clients at risk of hospitalization.
- Laurel Creek is a short term crisis residential treatment facility geared to be a step down from hospital settings and can be used to prevent hospitalization. Clients placed at Laurel Creek must be Seriously Mentally III and at imminent risk of destabilization without this support.
- **Inpatient/Hospital** facilities are used to stabilize clients who have become a danger to themselves, others, or are gravely disabled.




## AB109 Mental Health Quarterly Utilization, HSS



# Health & Social Services (HSS) Substance Abuse Services




- **Behavioral Health Assessment Team (BHAT)** assesses for acuity and level of care for substance using citizens of Solano County who are eighteen and older.
- Outpatient Substance Abuse (SA) Treatment is substance abuse treatment by a local provider, based on assessment. A typical program includes three 90 minute groups per week, an individual session and urine testing.
- **Detox** services are available 24 hours per day every day of the year and may last up to 15 days per episode.
- **Residential Substance Abuse (SA)Treatment** is for clients with multiple, serious needs (e.g. housing and support network) in addition to uncontrolled substance use may be authorized for residential treatment in which the client lives in the treatment facility for a period up to six months.
