PURPOSE STATEMENT – Community Corrections Partnership

The mission of the Community Corrections Partnership (CCP) is to discuss issues related to the implementation of various pieces of state legislation that focus on adult criminal offenders, including the realignment of many state public safety functions to local jurisdictions. The overall objective is to reduce the recidivism rate of adult offenders in the local criminal justice system.

Membership of the CCP is defined by the Community Corrections Performance Incentive Act of 2009 (SB 678) and includes the Chief Probation Officer (Chair)*, Presiding Judge of the Superior Court* or his or her designee, a County Supervisor or County Administrator, District Attorney*, Public Defender*, Sheriff*, the head of the Department of Social Services*, the head of the County Department of Mental Health, the head of the County Department of Employment, the head of the County Alcohol and Substance Abuse programs, the County Superintendent of Education, a local chief of police*, a representative of a community-based organization with experience in successfully providing rehabilitative services to persons convicted of criminal offenses, and an individual who represents the interests of victims.

Through AB 109/AB117 the CCP is responsible for recommending a local plan to the county Board of Supervisors (BOS) for the implementation of public safety realignment. This legislation also established an Executive Committee within the CCP. Each Executive Committee member is identified with an asterisk (*) above. The Executive Committee is responsible for approving the local plan for recommendation to the BOS.

Chief Hansen welcomed members and called the meeting to order.

Approval of Agenda

Tom Ferrara made a motion to approve the agenda. Motion seconded by Ann Edwards. No opposition. Motion carried (6-0).

Public Comment: No comments presented.

Approval of Minutes

Ann Edwards made a motion to approve the minutes. Motion seconded by Don du Bain. No opposition. Motion carried (6-0).

Data Report: *(See Handouts - PowerPoint – Probation Department, Sheriff's Office and Health & Social Services Data Presentation October 16, 2013)*

Melissa Johnson presented statistical information pertaining to the AB 109 population as of September 30, 2013.

- Probation AB 109 Population: 348
 - PRCS clients under supervision: 296
 - 1170(h) clients under supervision: 52
- Between the months of January-September 2013
 - PRCS assessed as high-risk (to recidivate) increased from 20%-26%
 - PRCS with warrants and/or in jail increased from 23%-35%
- For the Month of September 2013
 - 20% of PRCS had a warrant; 15% were in jail
 - Vallejo has the highest PRCS population (111), followed by Fairfield (66)- there has been a 25% drop in Fairfield since last quarter.
 - PRCS ethnic profile is stable; African American (44%); Caucasian (32%); Hispanic (18%); Other (6%)
 - 1170(h) females represent 21% of the population, compared to 6% in the PRCS population.
 - 1170(h) average age is younger; 26% for ages 26-30 as compared to 13% of PRCS

Gary Faulkner provided statistical information pertaining to the jail population as a result of Public Safety Realignment as of October 1, 2013.

- Jail Population: 940
- Parolees (3056): 65 in custody - represents 6.9% of jail population (Parole violators)
- 1170 (h) (N3's): 172 in custody - represents 18.2% of jail population (Sentenced)
- PRCS Violators: 52 - represents 5.5% of the jail population.
- Sheriff Enforcement Team (SET) Most Wanted 336; Apprehended 289;

Stephan Betz presented statistical information regarding referrals and placements for PRCS offenders.

- Substance Abuse Referrals: 308
- Substance Abuse Placements: 156
- Mental Health Referrals: 162
- Mental Health Placements: 125

Public Comments Regarding the Data Report:

Robert Schussel (Vallejo resident) expressed concern as to why the PRCS percentage is going down and if it is because the people that are yet to be released from CDCR are more violent. He wonders if this is a different population of people than were initially released which may be contributing to the percentages of offenders returning to custody. He also asked if the services were going to be modified with the levels of high risk offenders on the rise or with the age of the individuals coming under supervision.

Stacey Tracee asked the committee to consider more age appropriate services. She also asked if services would be modified to better serve the population in order to reduce the rate of recidivism.

Chief Hansen provided a brief explanation and response to Dr. Schussels' and Ms. Tracee's concerns.

CDCR Parole Update:

Deborah Johnson reported that the numbers in parole are continuing to decrease

- 596 Active Parolees in Solano County
- Overall Active Parolees by City: **Dixon** 15; **Fairfield** 202; **Suisun** 45; **Vallejo** 248; **Vacaville** 74

As of July 1st Parole revocation hearings have been turned over to the Solano County Courts and things seem to be going pretty well.

CDCR will be heading up "Operation Boo" in order to get and keep all sex offenders off the streets on Halloween during the "trick or treating" hours.

Center for Positive Change (CPC) Update:

Randy Focken, Probation Services Manager presented an update on the progress on the CPC. The Vallejo CPC is now fully operational including computers for educational purposes as well as training. The Fairfield CPC is currently being operated out of the probation office and hope to soon have a temporary if not permanent location for the Fairfield center.

We have two candidates for the Clinical Services Associates positions and hope to bring them on board in the next few weeks. We are also in the process of interviewing for the Mental Health Clinician positions.

An open house in Vallejo is tentatively scheduled for November. Information and exact dates will be sent out as soon as it is available.

Public Comments Regarding the Center for Positive Change Update:

Anthony Summers of Michael's Transportation Services Training Academy gave a brief update as to what has been going on with the partnership between Probation and the CPC referrals they have received. He expressed great excitement with the success rate that they are having.

B.A. Groves of Civil Liberties Action Coalition expressed the need for help within the community and questioned what this partnership is really doing to help the communities. She wants to know more information on the CPC in Vallejo. Chief Hansen directed her to speak with Shelley Freeman to obtain that information.

Education, Employment and Housing Workgroup Update:

Chief Hansen reconvened the Employment and Housing Workgroup committee. Stephan Betz will continue to serve as the Chair of the committee.

Budget Update:

Ian Goldberg presented an update on the on the 2011 Public Safety Realignment Budget for FY 2013/2014. (See Attachment)

Ian presented a request from the Probation Department asking the committee to consider a recommendation to the Board of Supervisors for funding in the amount of \$100,000 for rehabilitative housing as well as \$10,000 additional for transportation.

Tom Ferrara made a motion to approve the recommendation. Lesli Caldwell seconded the motion. No opposition. Motion carried (6-0)

Chief Hansen postponed this Item for action at a later date.

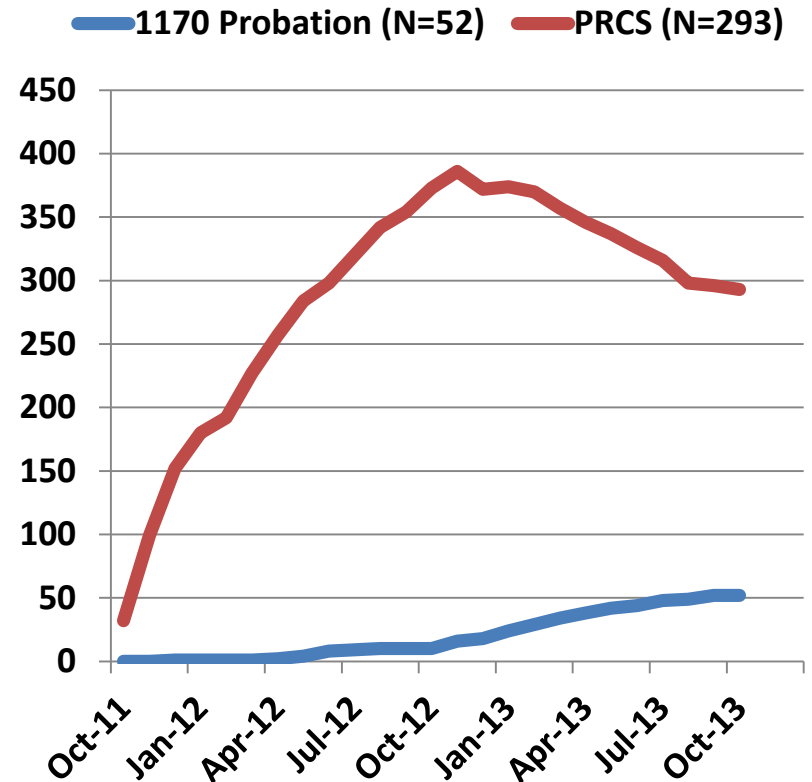
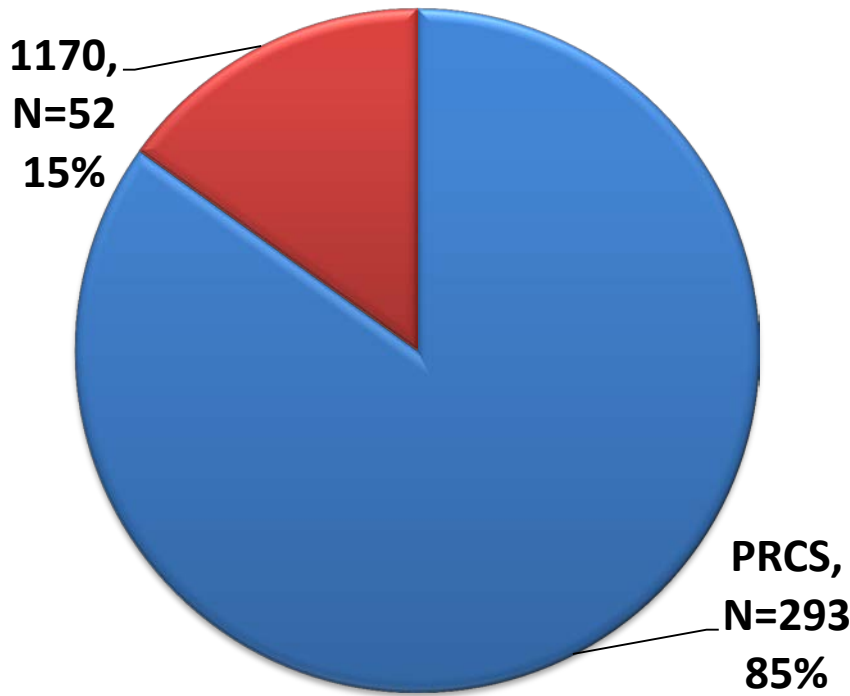

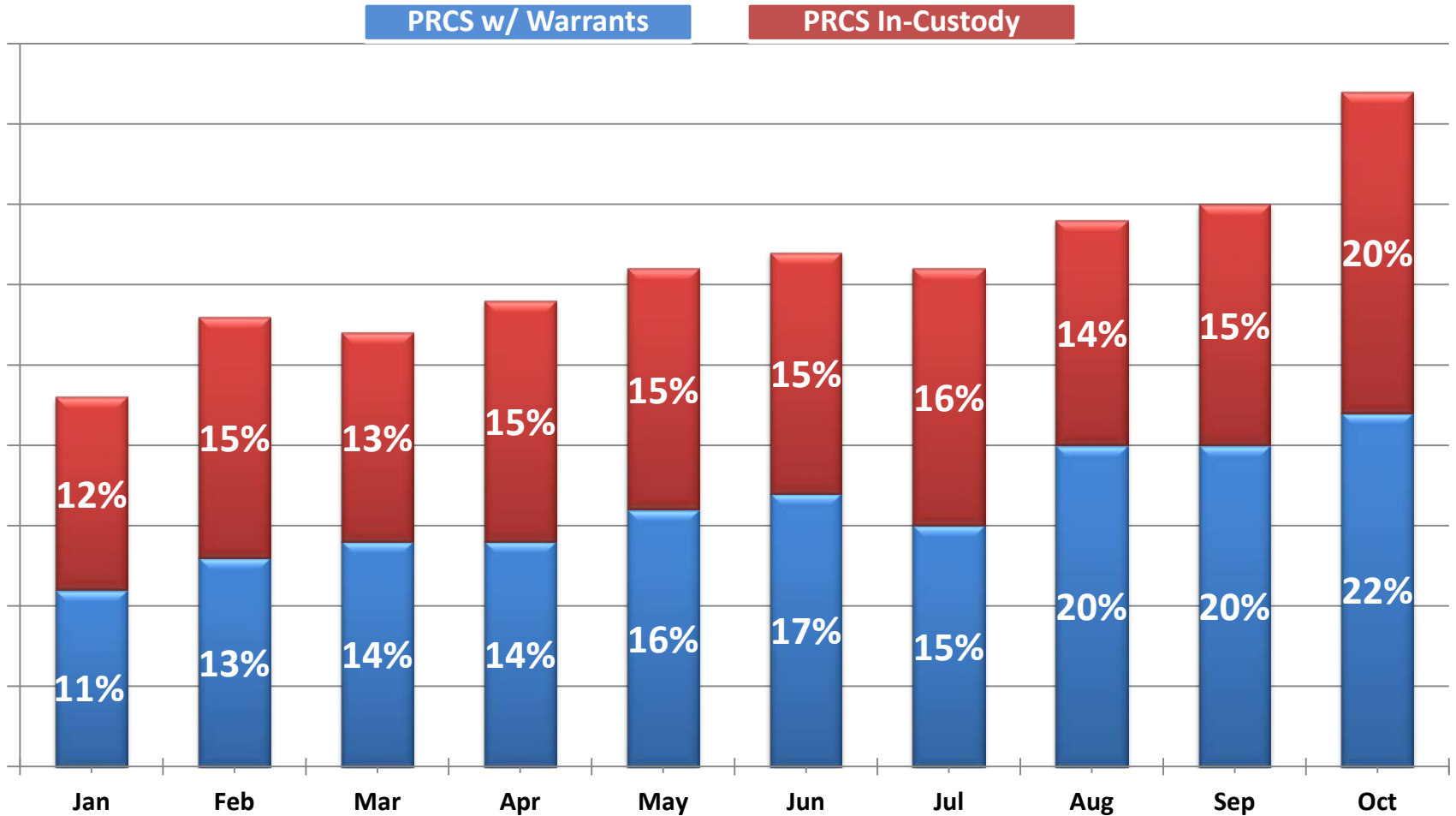
As of Oct 31 2013, there are 344* AB 109 Probationers on active supervision.



* One individual has both PRCS and 1170 grants

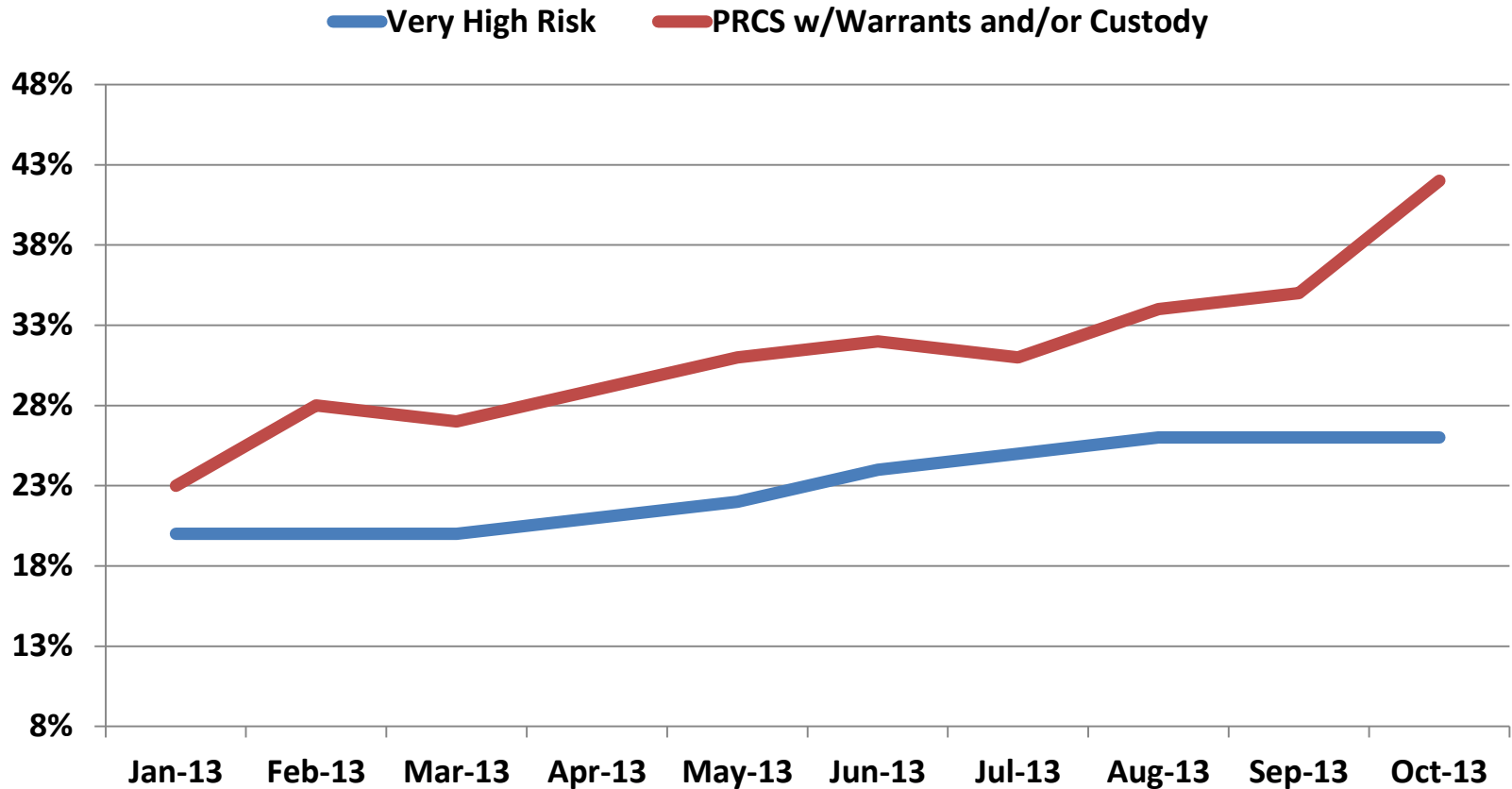


Since last month, the percentage for PRCS in-custody increased 5% percent. Additionally, PRCS with outstanding warrants increased 2%.





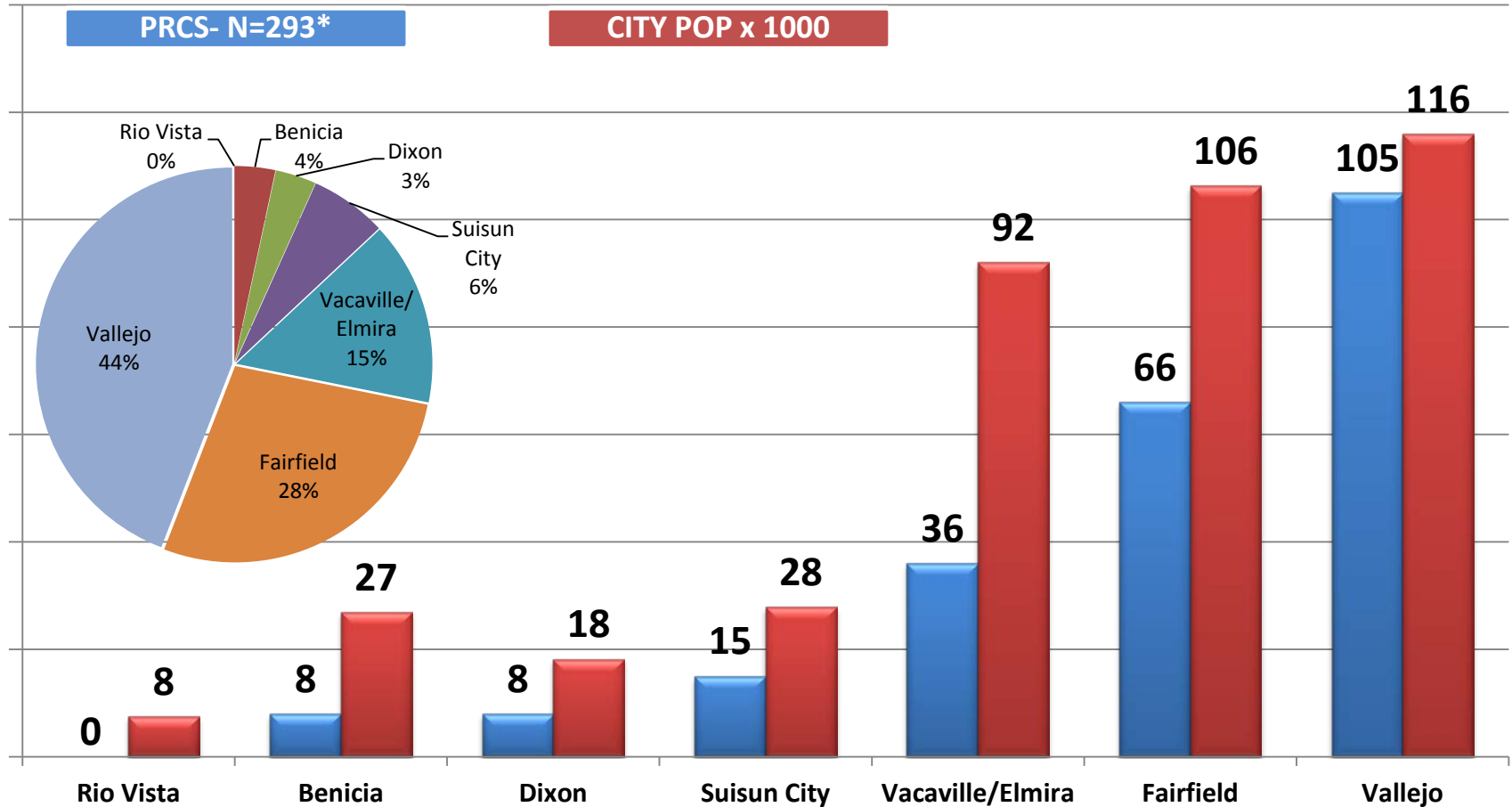
The percentage of PRCS assessed by the LS/CMI as Very High Risk (to recidivate) has remained at 26% percent. However, there has been an increase of 7% percent of PRCS with warrants and/or in custody (42%).





City of Residence for Supervised PRCS

The cities with the highest concentrations of PRCS per population are Vallejo, Fairfield, Suisun City, and Dixon- however, there has been an additional drop of 4 PRCS in Suisun City in October, down from 19 PRCS September and 24 in August.

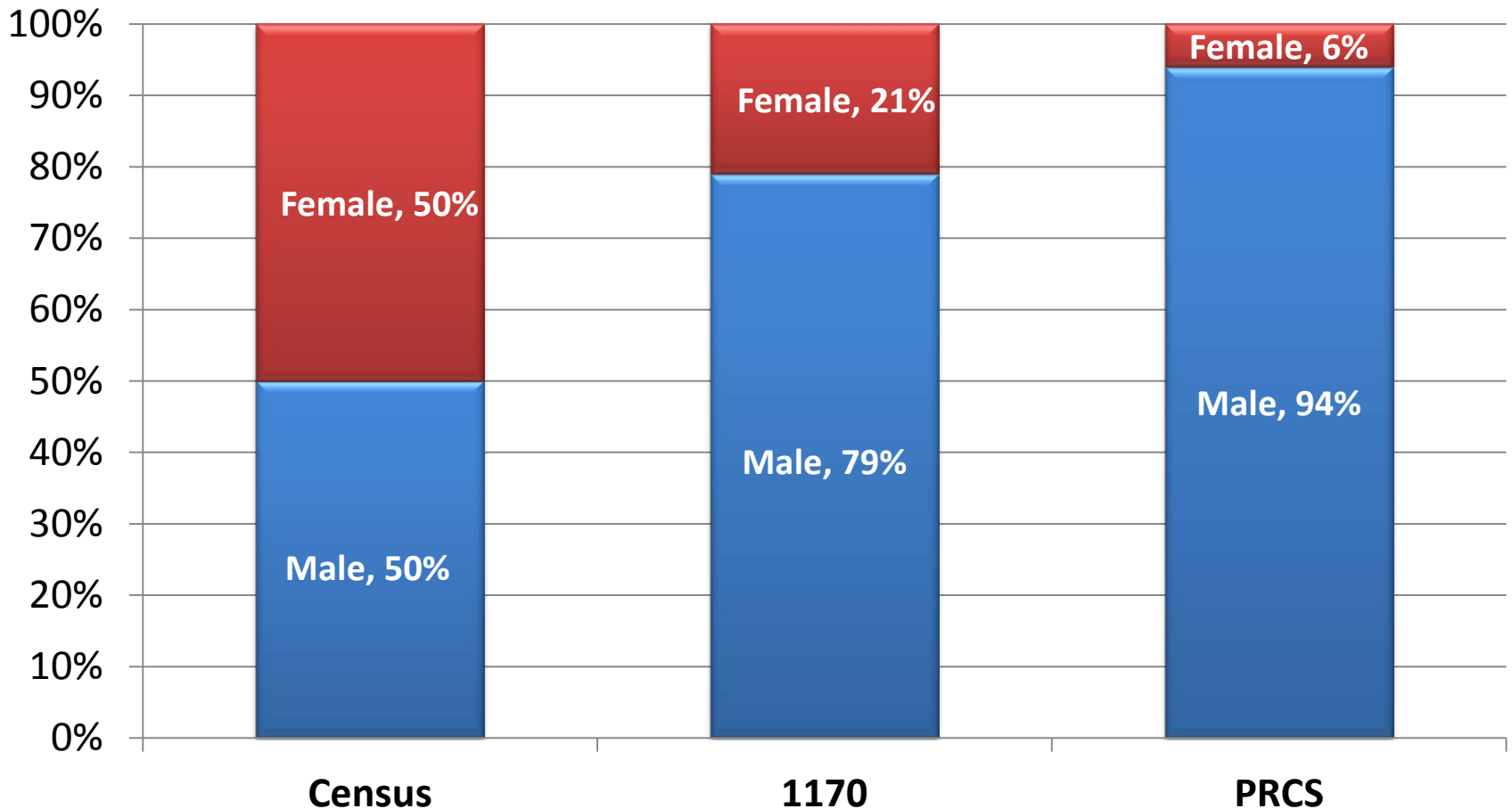

1170 females remain at 21%, over 3 times the rate of PRCS females (6%)

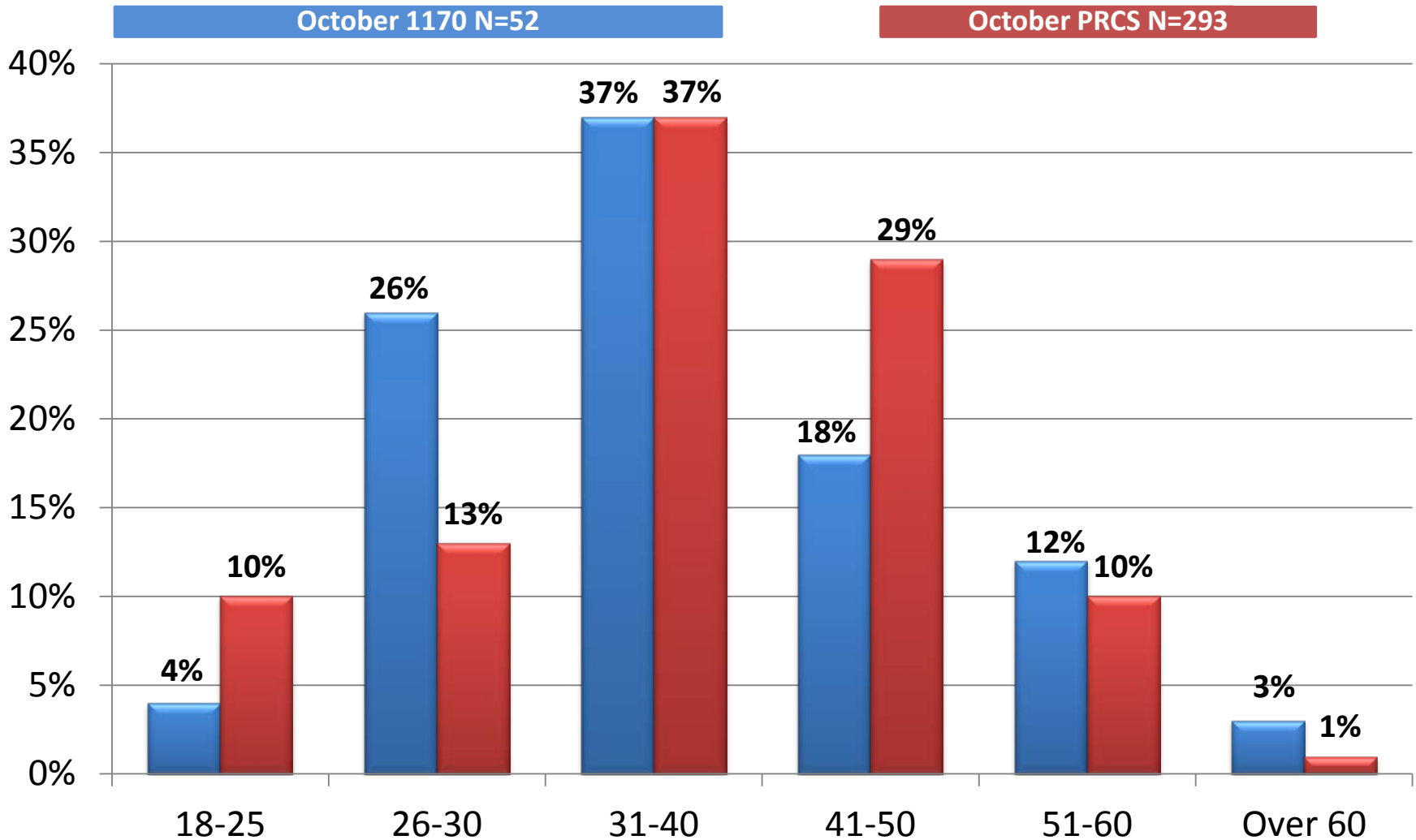
Gender differences between PRCS (N=293), 1170 (N=52), and Solano Census (N=413,344)





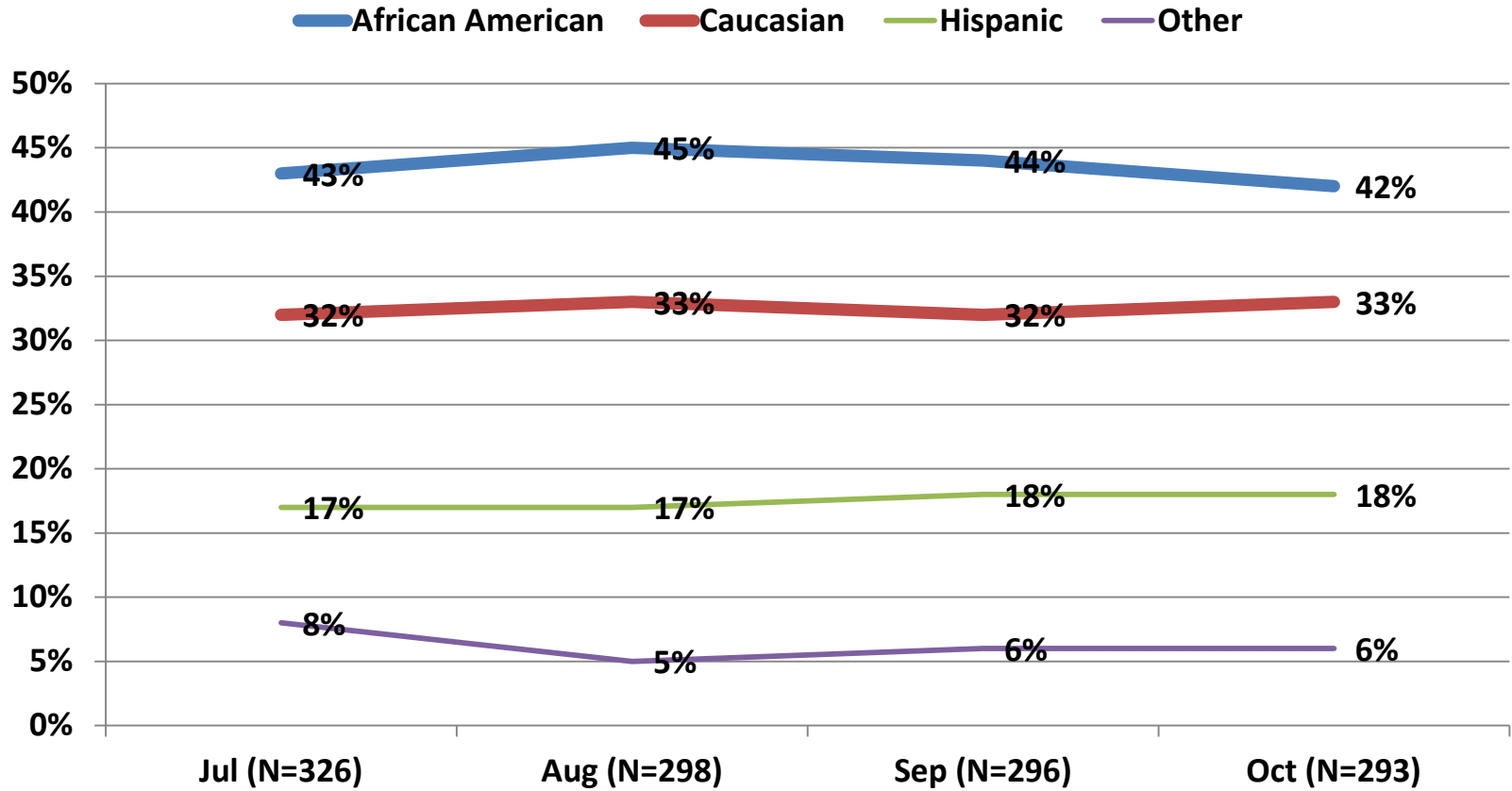
1170's are younger, on average

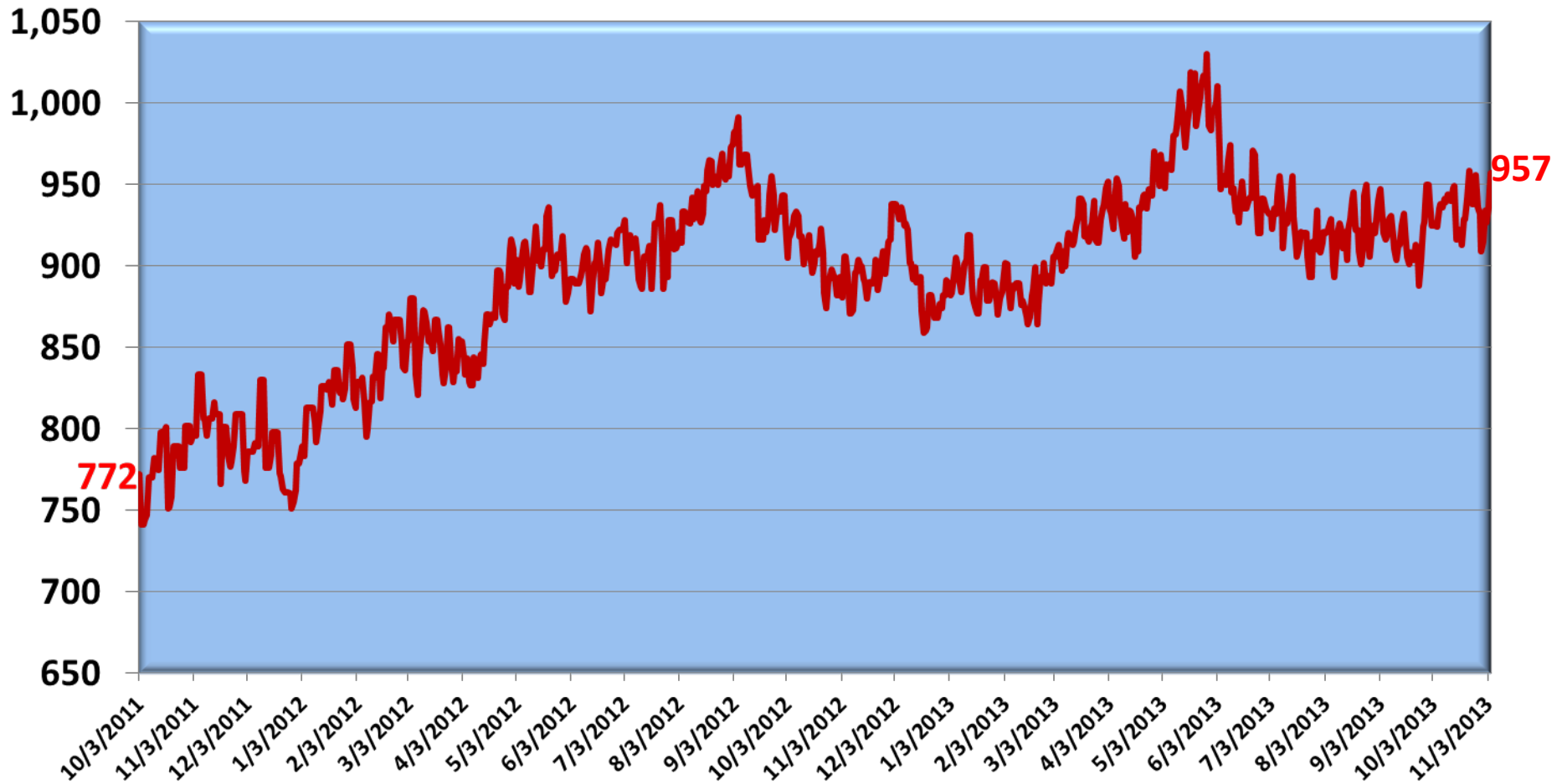

October 1st, 2011 – November 4th, 2013

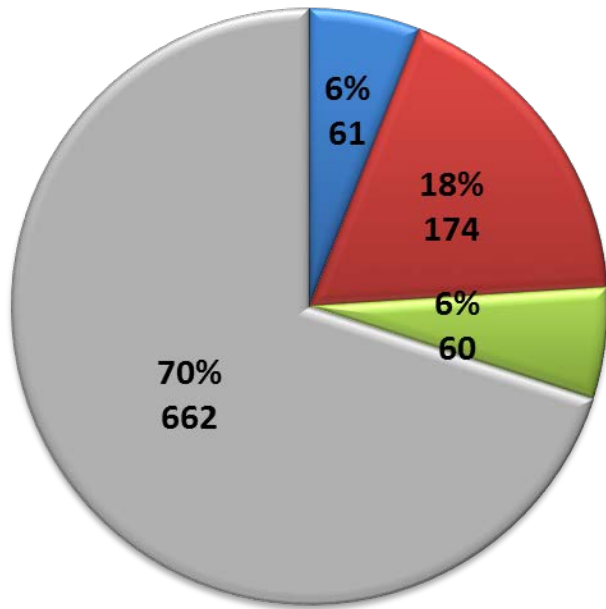

Percentage of Jail Population & Population Trends November 4th, 2013

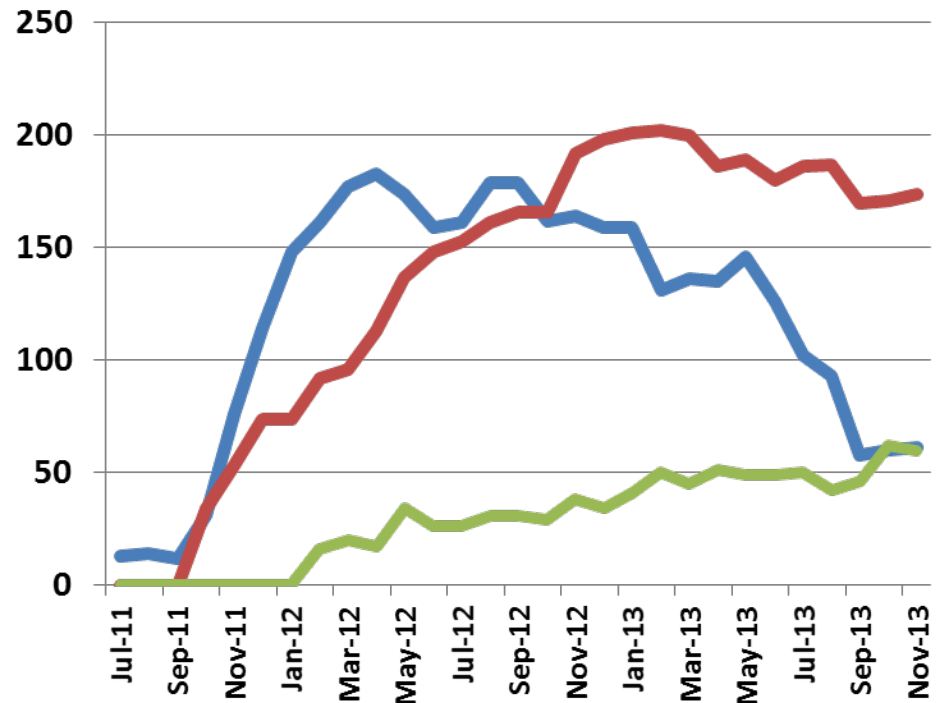

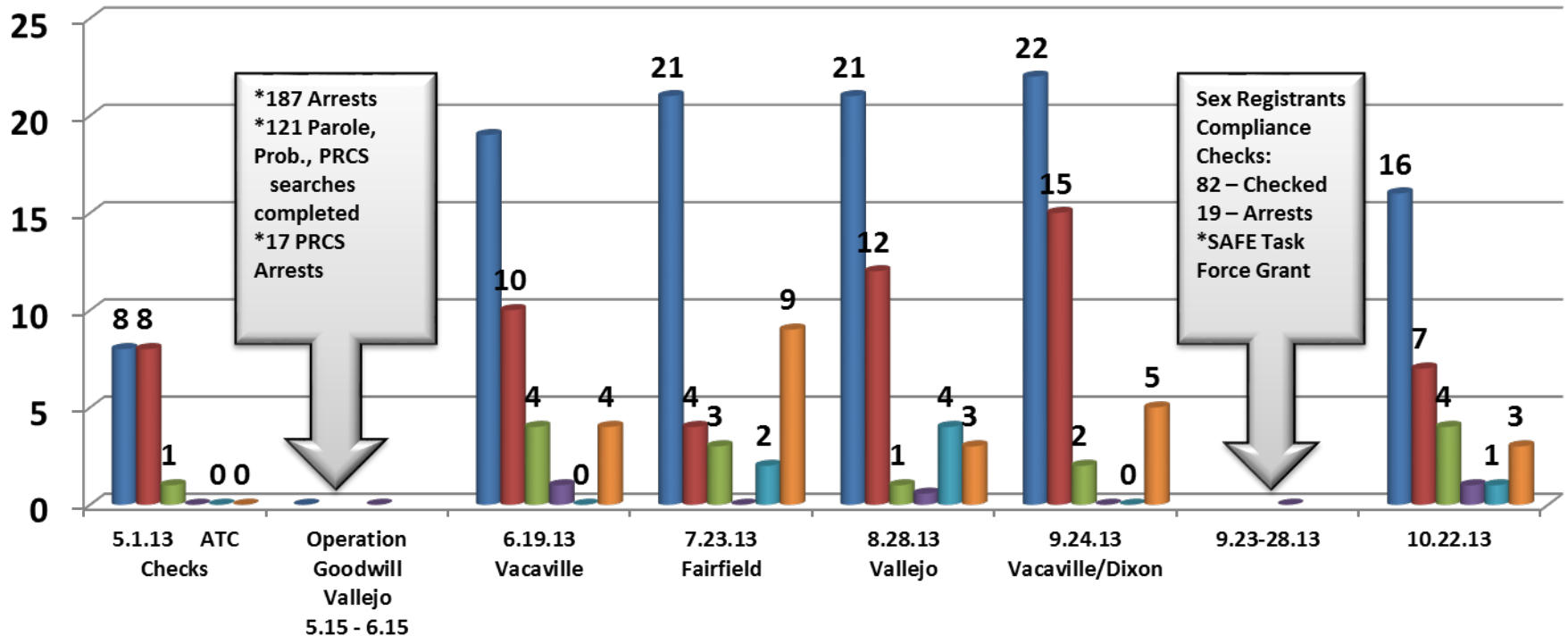
