# **Behavioral Health Services Act - Public Listening Session**

On Thursday, May 30, from 1 to 2 p.m., the California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) will host a <u>Behavioral Health Services Act (BHSA) public listening session</u> on the County Integrated Plan for Behavioral Health Services and Outcomes. This session is open to the public. Ask questions, provide feedback, and find out what is happening next with implementation of the Behavioral Health Services Act.

In March, California voters passed Proposition 1, which includes the BHSA and Behavioral Health Infrastructure Bond. The BHSA calls for a new County Integrated Plan for Behavioral Health Services and Outcomes that includes all local behavioral health funding and services. The plan requires counties to demonstrate coordinated behavioral health planning using all services and sources of behavioral health funding to provide increased transparency, stakeholder engagement, and outcomes for all local services. During the public listening session, attendees can provide direct input on the guidance DHCS is developing for the County Integrated Plan for Behavioral Health Services and Outcomes.

# State Senate approves Dodd's Vallejo police staffing bill



This week, the California Senate today approved legislation from Sen. Bill Dodd, D-Napa, that would help address chronic police staffing shortages in Vallejo by allowing qualified retired officers to work up to full-time for the Solano County Sheriff's Office, providing the additional deputies needed to aid the Vallejo during this staffing

emergency.

The Vallejo Police Department has become extremely understaffed, prompting the city council to declare a local emergency. The department is authorized to have 132 officers but is down to 31 officers patrolling a city of 123,000 people. On average, it takes up to two years to recruit and train new officers. One cost-effective interim solution that can be deployed relatively quickly is to use retired officers. However, retired officers may not work more than 960 hours per year under existing law, leaving gaps in staffing.

Sen. Dodd introduced Senate Bill 1379, which allows retired police officers to exceed the 960-hour limit for retired annuitants, for the next three years. The waiver would also apply to dispatchers, evidence technicians and police records personnel. The bill would allow for Solano County sheriff's deputies to respond to more emergency calls in Vallejo by giving them the necessary deputies to do so. The state has previously allowed retired employees to meet urgent staffing needs with similar exemptions.

SB 1379 is supported by the Vallejo Mayor Robert McConnell, Solano County Sheriff Tom Ferrara, Solano County Deputy Sheriffs Association, the Vallejo Chamber of Commerce and the California State Sheriff's Association. It cleared the Senate and now heads next to the Assembly.

### California Senate passes bill aiding SMART tax renewal



As SMART officials stay mum on when they will seek extension of a sales tax needed to keep trains rolling, a bill enabling voters to place a renewal on the ballot has passed the California Senate.

Senate Bill 904, authored by state Sen. Bill Dodd, a Democrat from Napa, was

proposed to help the Sonoma-Marin Area Rail Transit secure its

sales tax dollars, which account for nearly half of the agency's total revenue. The tax collects about \$51 million annually.

# Students present findings to Solano County Water Agency Board



Layo Ogunleye, Jada Cuffie, Kenzie Jacobs and Mia Zabat presented the results of their class's biomonitoring survey of Laurel Creek to the Solano County Water Agency Board at its May meeting.

The four students and their classmates in Jennifer Ault's Advanced Placement Environmental Science class at Vanden High School participated in a community science effort to monitor stream health throughout Solano County as part of the four-week Solano County Biomonitoring Program, a program provided by Solano Resource Conservation District.

The 15-year-old community science program offers a hands-on field trip at a nearby creek to high schools in Solano County. This unique long-term data set generated by students is part of a regional study conducted by our partner Dr. Patrick Edwards of Portland State University. Dr. Edwards and his team are working to develop ways in which participating students can better share their results with biomonitoring professionals and publish their findings in a scientific journal.

Jennifer Ault, AP Environmental Science teacher at Vanden, said, "The Biomonitoring Program meshes perfectly with the AP curriculum, and it gives students a chance to participate in meaningful environmental science in their own watershed. We do real work on the creek, which the students take very seriously, but we also really enjoy being outside in one of the wild parts of the County. Solano RCD's program is really special."

In their presentation, the students offered the Board a wellorganized and very engaging recap of their work this spring, focusing on the science learned during the program and the lessons they took away by participating. They discussed the sense of community and the understanding of the importance of human actions they gained from their experience. Furthermore, they explained the lessons they had learned about the differences between appearances and the reality of a healthy creek, and how that knowledge supported a more environmentally-conscious mindset going forward. Some students talked about coming away from the experience with a greater sense of how they can include environmental science in their futures, and others spoke of the impacts humans have, even unintentionally, on our local waterways.

The Solano County Biomonitoring Program is free to participating schools and is made possible with support from the Solano County Water Agency, Solano County Department of Resource Management, City of Benicia, Vallejo Flood and Wastewater District and the Fairfield Suisun Sewer District.

The RCD also offers free, hands-on, place-based watershed education throughout Solano County to third graders and sixth graders. These programs rely on the support of local donors, including Solano County Water Agency.

### **Solano Mobile Crisis Team Community Line**



The Solano Mobile Crisis Team community line is now live. The direct number to Mobile Crisis is: (707) 806-0866. The team continues to operate 24/7/365. Mobile Crisis Services are meant to support individuals in urgent mental health crisis, like suicidal thoughts or plans, or someone who may appear to be a danger to

themselves or others, or experiencing grave disability which means that someone is no longer able to provide for their own food, clothing, or shelter because of a mental health disorder.

The Team will call the person(s) and try to de-escalate and create a safety plan whenever possible at their home, in the community, or by phone, if able. If necessary, they will arrange transportation for the person to go to the Crisis Unit or Emergency Room. Anyone can call regardless of insurance.

# Filing process opens for city council and mayoral seats on July 15



Three Fairfield City Council seats are open for election on November 5, 2024: Districts 2, 4, and 6. Candidates must be 18 years of age or older, live in the respective district, and be registered to vote in that district. All open seats are four-year terms until 2028. The city clerk and city treasurer seats are also up for election and candidates must be registered to vote within Fairfield city limits.

Persons interested in running for these seats may obtain candidate nomination papers from the City Clerk's Office beginning Monday, July 15, 2024. The deadline for filing nomination paperwork is 5 p.m., Friday, August 9, 2024, unless an incumbent does not file by that time, in which case the filing period for that seat will be extended to 5 p.m. Wednesday, August 14, 2024.

The city clerk has made an informational video, "So You Want to Run for City Council," and checklist which details the steps needed to run for office. Both can be found at https://www.fairfield.ca.gov/election.

Potential candidates may obtain a Candidate's Handbook beginning July 15, 2024, by making an appointment with City Clerk Karen Rees, by calling (707) 428-7767 or emailing: klrees@fairfield.ca.gov.

The City Clerk's Office is located on the fourth floor in City Hall at 1000 Webster Street, Fairfield. Office hours are 8:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, but City Hall will be closed on Fridays: July 19 and August 2, 2024.

Potential candidates are required to comply with the California Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) regulation which requires filing a State of California Form 501, "Candidate Intention Statement," prior to the solicitation or receipt of any contributions, or expenditure of any personal funds, related to the upcoming election. # Vallejo Fire Department teams up with SolTrans for enhanced training



The Vallejo Fire Department has collaborated with SolTrans to enhance fire and rescue training exercises. This partnership allows the Vallejo Fire Department to use a portion of SolTrans' newly acquired 2.5-acre parcel on the 1800 block of Broadway St. for essential training from May through August of this year.

This agreement provides the Vallejo Fire Department with a realistic setting to conduct simulated fire and rescue training. These exercises prepare firefighters to handle real-world emergencies effectively and safely.

Importantly, there will be no "live fire" at this training site, alleviating any concerns about residents' air quality. However, a smoke machine will be used for certain training evolutions. This simulated smoke is safe to breathe and environmentally friendly, ensuring no negative impact on the community or environment. Sometimes, a "burn barrel" may be used to create real smoke on a small scale.

One of the most difficult things to do at any age is to walk into a room of strangers. Recognizing this, Carquinez Village practices

helping newer and less active members more easily join with others. Every Tuesday at 10 a.m., Villagers host a table at Raley's Café, offering open seating for any shopper wanting to stop by. Some weeks, as many as ten smiling faces will greet you. We share experiences, learn from each other, and by the end of a coffee with strangers, you may well leave with a couple of new friends.

In addition, Carquinez Village has recently started up a "Telephone Tree." Both current members and volunteers purposefully reach out to those who have been less active and therefore perhaps less connected. This begins with a call, perhaps a visit, to check in. Taking a sincere interest in another person is like a snowball: both people come away with something; a sense of being cared about; finding things in common; and often an invitation. "Do you know about the potluck this weekend? Well I would love it if you would consider coming with me, and we will go together."

According to the Tree Coordinator, Barbara Engdahl, most people just want to feel included and invited. In some cases, a long illness or other personal issue has kept the member away, and that call or visit reconnects them. Often a person sitting alone is just waiting for a friendly voice to reach out. Several of the buddies are now busy making other buddies!

Many Carquinez Village members have moved to Benicia or Vallejo to be closer to their adult children and grandchildren. These new residents have difficulty trying to meet people who are their peers. The Buddy Group attempts to address that need.

If the pandemic has taught us anything, it is the importance of staying socially and mentally connected to others. Healthy aging is strongly affected by people connections. AARP's May Bulletin highlights this in their article, "Staying Connected Is a Key to Healthy Aging", explaining how important it is for older people to keep in touch with each other. # California commission approved new I-80 toll lanes. Could you be charged \$1 per mile?


New toll lanes moved one step closer to hitting capital-region commuters in the wallet last week when the California Transportation Commission approved one east- and one westbound lane with fluctuating tolls for vehicles with one or two occupants on Interstate 80 through Yolo County.

Autumn Bernstein, the executive director of the Yolo Transportation District, told KDRT's Bill Buchanan in December that the actual

prices had not yet been determined, but <u>similar lanes in the Bay Area charge around \$1 a mile at peak traffic times</u>.


