

# Registrar of Voters to present Board of Supervisors with results of signature count and next steps for California Forever initiative



At their meeting on **Tuesday**, **June 25** in the Board Chambers, located at 675 Texas Street in Fairfield, starting at **2 p.m**., the Registrar of Voters (ROV) will present to the Solano County Board of Supervisors the results of the signature verification process and qualification of the "REZONING OF 17,500 ACRES OF LAND IN EAST SOLANO COUNTY TO ALLOW DEVELOPMENT OF A NEW COMMUNITY" Initiative (also known as "California Forever" or "East Solano Plan") for the November ballot.

As part of the presentation, the Board will receive a certified statement from the ROV that proponents collected enough signatures to qualify the initiative for the ballot.

The Board will consider one of three options pursuant to the California Elections Code section 9118:

(1) adopt the initiative without alteration at the meeting or within 10 days thereafter.

- (2) submit the initiative without alteration to voters by adopting a resolution calling for a special election and combining it with the next regular election on November 5, 2024 or
- (3) order an impact report to be presented to the Board within 30 days, at which time the Board may adopt the ordinance without alteration or submit it to the voters at the November 5, 2024 general election.

Because the impacts of the initiative have not yet been analyzed, staff is recommending the Board order the impact report (option 3) to be prepared and presented to them at their meeting on **Tuesday**, **July 23, 2024**.

#### **PUBLIC COMMENT**

The Solano County Administrator's Office is taking steps to ensure the public has safe and easy access to attend the Board meeting and provide public comment. As part of this process, we ask the public to be mindful of the following considerations, including:

- Seating in the Board Chambers is first-come-first serve. In the event the Board chambers reaches capacity, there will be an overflow area in the County's multipurpose rooms located on the first floor. Signage will direct attendees to the multipurpose room.
- The Board of Supervisors meeting will be livestreamed in the multipurpose rooms. There is a 30-second delay in the livestream broadcast.
- Participants who wish to make a statement as part of public comment must fill out a yellow comment card, available in both the Board chambers and multipurpose room, in advance of speaking. Staff will collect speaker cards and deliver them to the Chair of the Board.
- The Chair of the Board, with support from staff, will call speakers in groups, and direct them to the public comment area. Please note, ADA accommodation will be made for those who need / request it during the meeting.

### **ADDITIONAL CONSIDERATIONS / PUBLIC COMMENT**

Please be mindful of the following considerations as part of public comment, including:

- All public comments must be specific to California Forever and will be heard only during the 2 p.m. session.
- All public comments will be made after the item has been presented to the Board.
- All public comments need to be made in person. There will not be a call-in line.
- Subject to the discretion of the Board Chair, public comments may be limited to 1 minute.

 No signs, posters or noisemakers are permitted in the Board Chambers and multipurpose rooms.

#### ATTENDING IN PERSON / WATCH THE MEETING ONLINE

The Board of Supervisors meeting is hosted at the Solano County Administration Center, located at 675 Texas Street in the Board Chambers in Fairfield. In addition to the in-person meeting, the event will be livestreamed starting at 2 p.m. PST on the County's <u>website</u>. This meeting, along with all the previous Board of Supervisors' meetings, can be viewed as part of the County's video archive.

# Visit Link21's Online Open House



In June, Link21 hosted two virtual community meetings to share updates on Link21 planning progress prior to an important program milestone to determine which train

technology - standard-gauge (Regional Rail) or broad-gauge (BART) - will operate in the new underground train crossing of the San Francisco Bay.

If you didn't get a chance to join one of the virtual community meetings, you can still participate by visiting the Online Open House. This interactive, self-guided online public meeting enables you to learn more about the planning progress through animated maps and engaging Program information.

The Link21 Team is hosting the Online Open House to showcase our recent analysis completed of the different benefits that the train technologies can provide, such as service, mobility, and equity. This important milestone is the first step toward defining a project that will provide riders with enhanced and more reliable train options for traveling throughout the Northern California Megaregion.

The Online Open House will be available through July 19. **Simply visit** <u>Link21OpenHouse.com</u> to participate anytime, 24/7.

Link21 is a long-range transportation program sponsored by the San Francisco Bay Area Rapid Transit District (BART) and the Capitol Corridor Joint Powers Authority (Capitol Corridor). Together with partners, Link21 will transform the train system within the 21-county Northern California Megaregion, which includes the greater San Francisco Bay Area, the Monterey Bay area, the Sacramento area and the Northern San Joaquin Valley.

### California launches Sun Bucks



Earlier this month, the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) announced the upcoming launch of SUN Bucks in California, a new federal food program designed to ensure that children in families with low incomes have adequate nutrition while school is out for the summer.

"Keeping children healthy is a top priority for California, and I'm grateful to our many federal, state, and local partners for making this program a reality for California children and families," CDSS Director Kim Johnson said. "California is among the first states in the nation to launch this new food program, which will help ensure families have food on the table during the summer."

Children who qualify for free or reduced-price school meals through a school meal application or an alternative income form, or who receive CalFresh, CalWORKs, or Medi-Cal, are automatically enrolled.

Most families will not need to take action to receive SUN Bucks. SUN Bucks cards are scheduled to arrive in the mail beginning June 2024 and continue through fall 2024. Eligible families will receive SUN Bucks electronic benefits transfer (EBT) cards that can be used just like CalFresh benefits to purchase groceries.

SUN Bucks will provide \$120 per child, which is equivalent to \$40 per month for the three months schools are typically closed during the summer.

This new program is being implemented in partnership with the California Department of Education (CDE). In addition to SUN Bucks, the Summer Meal Programs provide opportunities for children in need to access meals during the summer months.



# Housing Element Program Implementation and Upcoming Meetings

You may recall that the City's certified Housing Element was shaped by the participation and voice of many Benicians. But did you know that the plan includes many tasks (programs) that the City must complete and report on each year?



The Benicia Planning Division is hard at work addressing these programs and will explore next steps at a City Council workshop scheduled for June 25 at 6 p.m.

At the workshop, key programs will be discussed that will drive important decisions over the coming year:

- The approach to rezoning site(s) to allow for feasible development at least 75 lower income units on the west side of town, north of I-780, in support of housing mobility (Program 2.04), and
- The approach to disposition (sale) of three city-owned sites for housing development (Program 1.16).

# Senate Bill 1379 clears Assembly Public Employment, Retirement Committee and heads to the State Assembly



Senate Bill 1379 clears Assembly Public Employment, Retirement Committee and heads to the State Assembly.

This bill introduced by State Senator Bill Dodd will help


address chronic police staffing shortages consistently experienced in Vallejo, by allowing qualified retired Solano County Sheriff's deputies and other retired peace officers to work up to full-time for the Solano County Sheriff's Office. These deputies will provide the additional support needed to patrol a city of 126,000 people.

SB 1379 will allow retired annuitants to exceed the 960-hour annual work hour limit for the next three years. Sen. Dodd said in a press release that, "allowing them to temporarily work more hours while recruitment ramps up for new, permanent officers can save taxpayers money while deterring crime and improving responsiveness."

The Vallejo Police Department (VPD) has become extremely understaffed, prompting the city council to declare and extend a local emergency. The VPD is authorized to have 132 officers and are currently down to 31 officers patrolling the city. On average, there is a two-year recruiting and training timeline for an officer to be ready and assigned to patrol duty.

To all of my newsletter recipients, please be careful when reading articles that inadvertently comingle terminology regarding "retired police officers". The SB 1379 was aimed exclusively to augment VPD staffing through the Solano County Sheriff's Department only.

# New California laws go into effect on July 1

Starting July 1, a batch of new laws will take effect in California:

### Security Deposit

With housing costs in California, and especially the Bay Area, historically among the highest in the nation, <u>AB 12</u> will cap a residential renter's security deposit at one month's rent, regardless of whether the property is furnished or not.

Under the law, a landlord who owns no more than two residential rental properties that collectively include no more than four dwelling units can collect up to two months' rent as a security deposit.

### Right to Repair

<u>Senate Bill 244</u> seeks to protect consumers who purchase electronic devices and appliances that cost more than \$50. The law will require manufacturers to provide owners with product tools, parts or instructions to repair a device.


California will become the third state after Minnesota and New York to enact a right to repair law.

### Junk Fees Transparency

SB 478 seeks to make hidden charges illegal, banning businesses from the practice of "bait and switch advertising." It will require all mandatory fees or charges to be stated up front, prohibiting undisclosed fees to be added at the end of transactions, like those often seen in the purchase of concert and sporting tickets and short term lodging.

# Fairfield unveils new utility billing system August 21



The Fairfield Municipal Water Utility is transitioning to a new online customer portal, *MyFMU* by SilverBlaze, on August 21. This new portal will replace the current online billing platform and is designed to significantly enhance user experience and will be accessible on desktop and mobile devices.

The *MyFMU* portal will offer several new features including:

- Enhanced autopay
- Access to payment history
- Detailed water usage history

Once the *MyFMU* portal is launched customers will need to reregister using the same account number.

Please be advised that the City will no longer absorb credit card fees. For customers registering for autopay and paying with a credit or debit card, a fee of \$2.95 per payment will be charged by the credit card processor. Payments made via ACH, check, or cash will not incur additional fees.

# Vallejo Fire Department urges residents to refrain from using illegal fireworks

Information from the Vallejo Fire Department:

As summer begins, the Vallejo Fire Department has already experienced an uptick in vegetation fire responses. With warming weather, the risk and severity of fires continue to increase.



The Vallejo Fire Department reminds residents that all fireworks are strictly prohibited within city limits, including the unincorporated areas. While it is widely known that illegal fireworks are inherently dangerous, they pose an even greater risk brought on by drought conditions and increasing temperatures.

The city requests that citizens report the use of illegal fireworks via <a href="SeeClickFix">SeeClickFix</a>. Reports will be reviewed, and warnings or administrative citations will be issued where possible. The Fire Department will use these reports to identify high-use areas. Firefighters and Prevention staff will patrol these areas and engage with neighbors to provide an education focused approach to

reducing illegal fireworks activity leading up to the 4th of July holiday. Informational door hangers will also be distributed.

The Fire Department aims to reduce the local threat of vegetation fires by limiting those caused by illegal fireworks. This strategy relies on outreach, education, and an increased presence of firefighters.

Effective immediately, firefighters will patrol neighborhoods at various times of the day to discourage and deter illegal fireworks use. On weekends, residents may see firefighters knocking on doors and handing out educational materials to further discourage the use of illegal fireworks.

"We need to work together as a community. Reporting illegal fireworks on <u>SeeClickFix</u> allows us to better allocate our resources and focus on areas with fireworks activity," Fire Chief Drayton states. "The Fire Department will use these reports to identify highuse areas for on-duty patrols by Firefighters and Prevention staff."


