VOTING OPTIONS FOR ALL VOTERS

In an effort to provide a safe voting environment, the Solano County Registrar of Voters has prepared several voting options for all voters. You have received a Vote by Mail ballot for the election in this packet.

Below is a description of the different options you have for voting to help provide a safe voting environment for all voters, our staff, and our community partners:

No Contact Voting:

As an option to in-person voting, all voters can vote from the safety of their home, using the enclosed ballot. Ballots can be returned to our office in one of three manners:



Ballot Drop-Off:

Starting October 7th through Election Day (29 days) - Ballot drop-off times and locations are identified on the next page (drop box is inside an office building).



Curbside Drop-off:

Starting October 31st through Election Day (5 days) - Curbside drop-off times and locations are identified on the next page (stay in your vehicle, hand ballot to poll workers).



Election Day Drop-Off:

Election Day (1 day) - Poll Place drop-off locations are available on Election Day-all locations are open from 7a.m. to 8p.m.

All ballots must be received or post-marked by Election Day. All postage is paid by the Registrar of Voters Office for voters mailing ballots back to our office. Voters do not have to vote this ballot, and can still choose to vote in-person using one of the options listed below.

Limited Contact Voting:



At your assigned poll place, you can request to vote "curbside" from the comfort of your vehicle. Look for the blue cone outside of your polling place, and call the number listed on the cone. Poll workers will come out to your vehicle with your ballot and will securely deposit it for you.

This same curbside option is available if you want to drop off your Vote by Mail ballot. It may be preferable for you to remain in your vehicle and we support that option.

In-Person Voting:



Traditional polling places are still available. Your assigned location is included on the cover sheet with your official ballot. Some voters may experience additional wait times due to the need to provide social distancing within the voting location. Please be prepared: it may take longer than usual to vote at your polling place.

If you need assistance...

As a voter, you may bring up to two individuals with you to your polling place to help you cast your ballot, as long as those individuals do not represent your employer or your union. Your polling place will have copies of the ballot in Spanish and Tagalog and may have poll workers ready to assist you who speak Spanish and Tagalog.

WHAT OFFICES ARE ON THIS BALLOT?

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE L

Measure L is the "Fairfield Business License Modernization and Simplification Measure." Measure L was placed on the ballot by a unanimous vote of the City Council. If approved by the voters, this Measure would amend the Fairfield Municipal Code to update the City's business license structure, and increase the rates of business license tax paid by businesses in the City.

The City of Fairfield, like many cities, requires businesses that operate in the City to obtain a business license, and pay an annual business license tax to help support the City's infrastructure, programs, and services. In a 2024 City Council study session on the issue, staff informed the City Council that the structure and tax rates have not been changed since 1984. The current business license tax ordinance includes a structure that determines business license tax rates based on multiple tiered rates for different types of businesses and levels of gross annual revenue. Measure L would reduce the number of tiers of businesses, and simplify administration of the ordinance. Business license tax rates would increase by various amounts specified in Measure L for businesses in each of the new tiers. The rates for smaller businesses would be less than for larger businesses.

The business license tax is a general tax, which means the tax revenue can be spent for all general governmental purposes. The City estimated that this Measure will raise approximately \$1,000,000 per year in new local revenue for use in the City. The City Council's adopted ballot question states this new revenue could be used to protect essential City services, including fixing potholes and maintaining streets; maintaining 9-1-1 response times; city park maintenance; senior and youth programs; and other general government purposes.

Measure L would permit the City Council to make other adjustments to the business license ordinance that do not increase the tax rates above what is allowed by Measure L. In the future, tax rates would be adjusted annually to reflect CPI increases. Measure L would be in effect until ended by the voters. Revenue from Measure L is subject to the City's annual budget and audit requirements.

Article XIIIC of the California Constitution, commonly known as Proposition 218, requires that the proposed general tax be approved by a majority of the voters voting on the Measure. A "yes" vote on Measure L is to amend the business license

ordinance and increase tax rates. A "no" vote on Measure L is to not amend the business license ordinance and keep the tax rates and structure the same.

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRFIELD APPROVING AND ORDERING THE SUBMISSION TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF FAIRFIELD A BALLOT MEASURE TO AMEND CHAPTER 10(B) OF THE FAIRFIELD MUNICIPAL CODE TO MODERNIZE AND SIMPLIFY THE BUSINESS LICENSE TAX AT THE GENERAL ELECTION TO BE HELD ON TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 5, 2024, DIRECTING THAT THE CITY ATTORNEY PREPARE AN IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS AND PROVIDING FOR ARGUMENTS AND REBUTTALS RELATED TO THE MEASURE

WHEREAS, Fairfield is a full-service city, equipped with its own City-run police, fire, park, public works including water utility services; and

WHEREAS, the health, safety, and welfare of all residents in the City of Fairfield ("the City") is the City's top priority; and

WHEREAS, the City of Fairfield faces a structural budget deficit that it is trying to solve; and

WHEREAS, the general fund pays for important City services such as police, fire, and paramedic services; 911 emergency response; emergency street repairs and maintenance; neighborhood park and recreation services; and general municipal services to the public; and

WHEREAS, the City proposes modernize and simplify the Business License Tax, until ended by voters, as directed by City Council; and

WHEREAS, the proposed changes are designed to attract, retain, and encourage business growth and job creation in Fairfield, and increase some rates, while simplifying oversight and compliance; and

WHEREAS, the tax was last adjusted 40 years ago in 1984 and includes a complicated structure of 24 tiered rates for different types of businesses; and

WHEREAS, the proposed changes, locally enacted, could generate approximately \$1 million in additional annual funding for local general services. The Business License Tax is a general tax that is deposited into the City's general fund; and

WHEREAS, local, voter-approved funding for essential services will provide a guaranteed source of funding for the City of Fairfield that cannot be taken by the State and all funds would stay in Fairfield for local services and infrastructure only; and

WHEREAS, the proposed measure will be subject to fiscal accountability protections such as public disclosure of all spending; mandatory annual audits that ensure funds are used effectively and as promised and only to benefit the Fairfield community; and

WHEREAS, the general rule is that a Business License Tax must be placed on a regularly scheduled general election for members of the City Council, unless the City Council adopts a resolution proclaiming a fiscal emergency; and

WHEREAS, at the March 12, 2024, City Council Study Session, the Council directed staff to bring back to the Council for approval Transient Occupancy Tax and Business License Tax Modernization and Simplification Ballot measures to be placed on November 2024 ballot; and

WHEREAS, the current 24 tiers structure of the Business License Tax is difficult to administer, and a lot has changed in the 40 years since it was last updated, including new industries and dramatic changes to how people work; and

WHEREAS, the current structure places an unfair burden on small businesses and does not ensure that larger businesses pay a fair share for the city services and infrastructure they utilize; and

WHEREAS, to qualify for the ballot, 2/3 of the City Council (5 of 7 members) are required to approve the Business License Tax ordinance. If a council member is absent from the meeting, 5 City Council Members are still required to vote affirmatively for the item to qualify for the ballot; and

WHEREAS, if so, approved by the Council, and then passed by the voters on Tuesday, November 5, 2024, with a majority of voters (50% plus 1) supporting the measure, it would go into effect on January 1, 2025.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRFIELD HEREBY RESOLVES:

Section 1. The City Council pursuant to its right and authority, does order to be submitted to the voters at the General Election to be held on November 5, 2024, the following question:

Section 2. The proposed measure submitted to the voters is hereby approved in Ordinance 2024-04, which is incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 3. The City will reimburse the county for the actual cost incurred in conducting the election upon receipt of a bill stating the amount due as determined by the election's official.

Section 4. In all particulars not recited in this Resolution, the election shall be held and conducted as provided by law for holding municipal elections.

Section 5. Notice of the time and place of holding the election is given and the City Clerk is authorized, instructed and directed to give further or additional notice of the election, in time, form and manner as required by law.

Section 6. Pursuant to California Elections Code Section 9280, the City Council hereby directs the City Clerk to transmit a copy of the measure to the City Attorney. The City Attorney shall prepare an impartial analysis of the measure, not to exceed 500 words in length, showing the effect of the measure on the existing law and the operation of the measure, and transmit such impartial analysis to the City Clerk not later than 5 p.m. on August 14, 2024.

Section 7. Arguments for or against this measure shall be submitted not later than 5 p.m. on August 16, 2024, to the City Clerk.

Section 8. The City Council adopts the provisions of subdivision (a) of Section 9285 of the Elections Code to permit rebuttal arguments if arguments have been filed in favor of and against the measure which is being submitted to the voters of the City at this special election. Rebuttal arguments shall be filed not later than 5:00 p.m. on August 20, 2024.

Section 9. The City Clerk is hereby directed to file a certified copy of this Resolution with the Solano County Board of Supervisors and the Solano County Registrar of Voters.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE R

Measure R would authorize the sale of general obligation bonds of the Travis Unified School District ("District") in series in the aggregate amount of up to \$65,000,000. Measure R will not amend any existing laws. The District's governing board ("Board") placed Measure R on the ballot.

The California Constitution limits the use of proceeds from such bonds to construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities.

Bond proceeds must be used to repair, modernize, replace, renovate, expand, construct, acquire, equip, furnish and otherwise improve the classrooms and school facilities of the District's existing schools, new school sites, and other Districtowned facilities as identified in the Bond Project List (reprinted completely in the sample ballot pamphlet). These bond funds cannot be used for salaries or other school operating expenses.

The District cannot guarantee that the bonds will provide sufficient funds to allow completion of all the Bond Projects. Certain projects may require State matching funds for their completion.

Independent performance and financial audits must be conducted annually. By law, the District is required to have an independent citizens' oversight committee to help ensure that bond funds are spent only for projects included in the Bond Project List.

If Measure R is approved, the District may issue bonds either under the Government or Education Code which would be repaid through a property tax levied and collected by the County each year on all taxable property within the District in an amount sufficient to pay the interest and principal coming due prior to the next year's tax levy. The District's Tax Rate Statement printed in this pamphlet contains the District's best estimate of the average annual tax rate that would need to be levied to fund the proposed bonds is \$59.36 per \$100,000 of assessed value of taxable property within the District and the stated best estimate of the highest tax rate would be \$59.61 per \$100,000. The taxes are scheduled to be collected through 2051-52. The District estimates the total debt service during the life of the bonds, including principal and interest, would be \$126,000,000.

The procedures required for the approval and issuance of the general obligation bonds, including the process of submitting Measure R to the vote of the District's electors, were satisfied.

Measure R requires approval by 55 percent of the voters of the district voting on it.

A "Yes" vote is a vote to authorize the issuance of bonds totaling up to \$65,000,000 to fund specified

school facilities projects secured by the levy of ad valorem taxes on property located within the District.

A "No" vote is a vote to not authorize the issuance of the bonds.

TAX RATE STATEMENT

An election will be held within the boundaries of the Travis Unified School District ("District") on November 5, 2024 to authorize the sale of up to \$65,000,000 in bonds to finance facilities as described in the measure. If the bonds are approved, the District expects to sell the bonds in multiple series. Principal and interest on the bonds will be payable from the proceeds of tax levies made upon the taxable property located within the District. The following Information is provided in compliance with Sections 9400 to 9404, inclusive, of the California Elections Code.

- 1. The best estimate from official sources of the average annual tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on assessed valuations available at the time of the election and a projection based on experience within the same jurisdiction and other demonstrable factors, is estimated to be \$59.36 per \$100,000 (5.936¢ per \$100) of assessed valuation. The final fiscal year in which the tax is anticipated to be collected is 2051-52.
- 2. The best estimate from official sources of the highest tax rate that would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue, and an estimate of the year in which that rate will apply, based on assessed valuations available at the time of filing this statement, and a projection based on experience within the same jurisdiction and other demonstrable factors, is estimated to be \$59.61 per \$100,000 (5.961¢ per \$100) of assessed valuation first occurring in fiscal year 2051-52.
- 3. The best estimate from official sources of the total debt service, including the principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold is \$126 million.

Voters should note that the estimated tax rate is based on the ASSESSED VALUE of taxable property on the Solano County official tax rolls, not on the property's market value. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

Attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon the District's projections and estimates only, which are not binding upon the District. The actual tax rates, debt service and the years in which they will apply may vary from those presently estimated, due to variations from these estimates in the timing of bond sales, the amount of bonds sold and market interest rates at the time of each sale, and actual assessed valuations over the term of repayment of the bonds. The dates of sale and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on need for construction funds and other factors. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold will depend on the bond market at the time of each sale. Actual future assessed valuation will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

MEASURE R

FULL TEXT

TRAVIS UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT FACILITIES REPAIR AND IMPROVEMENT MEASURE

By approval of this measure by at least fifty-five percent (55%) of the registered voters voting thereon, the Travis Unified School District shall be authorized to issue and sell bonds of up to \$65 million in aggregate principal amount to provide financing for the specific high school facilities projects listed below in the Bond Project List, subject to all of the accountability safeguards specified herein.

SECTION I: KEY FINDINGS

- The Governing Board of the District believes that a high-quality education is the fundamental right of every student, and seeks to provide a 21st century education in a safe and engaging learning environment for all students:
- Many schools and buildings are 30 to 70 years old, and many of the schools need repairs and improvements to meet modern educational and safety standards;
- The District must repair, construct, acquire or equip classrooms, sites, and facilities to make them safe and help ensure that all students have equal access to 21st century classrooms, labs and school facilities;
- The Board has conducted a facilities needs assessment that included community members, staff and families to identify priority projects at each school site;
- Classrooms and educational facilities require updates for improved student learning in subjects like science, technology, engineering, arts and math to accommodate 21st century learning methods and support hands-on instruction and learning by doing;
- The Board has conducted a facilities needs assessment that included community members, staff and families to identify priority projects at each school site;
- The Board believes it is a wise investment to protect the quality of our schools, the quality of life in our community and the value of our homes;
- The District has reviewed its facilities needs and aligned them to the District's educational goals;
- Because State funding is limited, passing this bond measure provides a guaranteed source of local funding to maintain and improve this community's local school facilities;
- This bond measure will benefit local schools, and its funding will be controlled locally; no funds may be taken away by the State or other school districts, and by law, no money may be used for administrator salaries or pensions;
- This bond measure requires strict fiscal accountability protections including mandatory annual audits and an independent citizens' oversight committee to ensure funds are managed and spent properly.

SECTION II: ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURES

The provisions in this section are included in this proposition in order that the voters and taxpayers of the District may be assured that their money will be spent to address specific facilities needs of the District, all in compliance with the requirements of Article XIII A, section 1(b)(3) of the State Constitution, and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000 (codified at Section 15264 et seq. of the California Education Code).

Evaluation of Needs. The Governing Board has evaluated the facilities needs of the District and has identified projects to finance from a local bond measure at this time. The Governing Board hereby certifies that it has evaluated safety, class size reduction and information technology needs in developing the Bond Project List.

Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee. The Governing Board shall appoint a new or empower an existing independent Citizens' Oversight Committee to ensure bond proceeds are expended only for the school facilities projects listed in the Bond Project List. The committee shall be established within sixty (60) days of the date when the Board enters the results of the election in its official minutes.

Annual Performance Audit. The Board shall conduct or cause to be conducted an annual, independent performance audit to ensure that the bond proceeds have been expended only on the school facilities projects described in the Bond Project List.

Annual Financial Audit. The Board shall conduct or cause to be conducted an annual, independent financial

audit of the bond proceeds until all of those proceeds have been spent for the school facilities projects described in the Bond Project List.

Annual Report to Board. Upon approval of this measure and the sale of any bonds approved, the Board shall take actions necessary to establish an account in which proceeds of the sale of bonds will be deposited. As long as any proceeds of the bonds remain unexpended, the Superintendent shall cause a report to be filed with the Board no later than April 30 of each year, commencing on the first April 30 after bonds have been issued and proceeds spent, stating (1) the amount of bond proceeds received and expended in the past fiscal year, and (2) the status of any project funded or to be funded from bond proceeds. The report may be incorporated into the annual budget, annual financial report, or other appropriate routine report to the Board.

SECTION III: BOND PROJECT LIST

This Bond Project List, which is an integral part of this measure, describes the projects the District proposes to finance with proceeds of the bonds. All information contained within this "Section III: Bond Project List" (hereinafter "Bond Project List") comprises the list and description of permissible projects and expenses that may be paid from bond proceeds, and where such projects may be or are intended to be completed.

Proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by this measure shall be used only for the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, replacement, furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities, all as listed on the Bond Project List. All projects to be financed with bonds authorized by this measure listed on the Bond Project List have been determined by the District to be "school facilities" as that term is used in the California Constitution. "School facilities" include projects at school sites as well as administrative and teacher/staff support facilities which are necessary for, and related to, the delivery of high-quality education services.

In order to meet all identified facility needs, the District may complete projects using a combination of funding sources, including joint use funds or contributions, development impact fees, state funding (if available), and federal grant funding. The District will pursue state matching funds if and when they become available, and if received, they will be used for projects on the Bond Project List or other high priority capital outlay expenditures as permitted by law. Approval of this measure does not guarantee that all projects on this Bond Project list at all listed sites will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by this measure. The District's proposal for the projects assumes the receipt of some state matching funds, which could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond measure. Bond funds may be used to meet any matching share contribution requirements.

Specific projects to be funded by the bond measure include, without limitation, the following:

A. PROJECTS TO IMPROVE SECURITY FOR STUDENTS AND STAFF

- Install new or replace deteriorating campus fencing and gates;
- Improve security at schools by providing or upgrading public address and emergency communication systems, installing new or additional security cameras, providing additional lighting, replacing doors and installing security alarms;
- Relocate or reconfigure front office spaces to enable controlled entry to school buildings.

B. PROJECTS TO UPGRADE AND MODERNIZE BUILDING SYSTEMS

- Replace outdated and deteriorating drain and sewer lines, boiler lines and main storm drain lines;
- Improve school site network infrastructure and provide updated classroom electrical capacity and audio/visual technology;
- Upgrade restrooms and replace plumbing fixtures.

C. PROJECTS TO MEET CURRENT SAFETY STANDARDS

- Resurface playground blacktops, repair or replace uneven hardscapes and replace field turf;
- Upgrade fire alarms;
- Upgrade sites to meet Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliance;
- · Replace aging office trailers.

D. PROJECTS TO REPAIR AND UPGRADE BUILDING FACILITIES AND EXTERIORS

- Replace aging and deteriorating roofs and gutters; replace and repair building siding and trim; repaint school exteriors;
- Resurface parking lots;

Install or repair shade structures on school campuses and create sheltered eating and outdoor learning areas as needed.

E. PROJECTS TO IMPROVE HEATING, VENTILATION AND AIR CONDITIONING SYSTEMS

- Replace facility boilers and chillers;
- Replace heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) systems.

F. PROJECTS TO REPAIR AND EXPAND CLASSROOMS AND FACILITY INTERIORS

- Replace, upgrade or reconstruct facilities to support high quality programs in all subjects, including, without limitation, science, math, reading, writing, robotics and technology instruction;
- Renovate or replace aging restrooms, and add additional staff restrooms:
- Provide new or improved flooring; paint facility interiors; repair and replace windows;
- Replace portable buildings;
- Replace lockers in physical education facilities.

G. PROJECTS TO UPGRADE AND MODERNIZE STUDENT PLAYGROUNDS AND PLAYFIELDS

- Regrade and level fields:
- Upgrade irrigation systems;
- Resurface running tracks:
- Repair and update stadiums;
- Restructure fields for new sports and marching band activities;
- Provide new lighting for fields and stadiums serving sports and band;
- Surface par course;
- Repair and/or replace play structures and play structure surfaces.

PROJECTS TO UPGRADE AND MODERNIZE FACILITIES FOR STUDENTS AND STAFF H.

- Construct, furnish and equip and/or renovate, modernize, upgrade, repair, and replace:
 - Restroom facilities:
 - Kitchen and cafeteria facilities, including the central kitchen;
 - Multi-purpose rooms;
 - Gym and stadium facilities;
 - Theater and performing arts spaces and library facilities.

Projects listed above may be completed at any and all properties, school sites and facilities where such project is determined necessary, and projects are authorized to be performed at each and all of the District's schools, sites and facilities, including administrative and ancillary support facilities, whether owned, leased or yet to be acquired, including, without limitation, the following:

Cambridge Elementary Foxboro Elementary Travis Elementary Vanden High School

Center Elementary Scandia Elementary

Golden West Middle School

Travis Education Center, Travis Community Day School, and

Travis Independent Study Program

Listed projects, repairs, improvements, rehabilitation projects and upgrades will be completed as needed and feasible. Projects may be done in phases over time, based on Governing Board priorities and available funding. Decisions regarding the scope, timing, prioritization or other facets of project implementation will be made solely by the Governing Board by subsequent action. Where terms such as "repair," "update," "replace," and "improve" are used in the Bond Project List, the Governing Board has the discretion to determine the best method for accomplishing the project's objective. For any listed project involving renovation or modernization of a building or the major portion of a building, the District may proceed with new replacement construction instead (including any necessary demolition), if the District determines that replacement and new construction is more practical than renovation, considering the building's age, condition, expected remaining life, comparative cost and other relevant factors. In addition, where

feasible, projects may be completed in partnership with other public or private agencies on a joint use basis using bond proceeds, subject to federal tax rules and regulations. Property, buildings and equipment on the bond project list may be acquired through lease, sale, lease-purchase, lease-leaseback or other project delivery or acquisition methods determined appropriate by the Board. Bond funds may be used to support local match contribution requirements for facility funding that becomes available for projects on the Bond Project List. Listed projects may be completed at any and all District schools, sites, properties (owned, leased or yet to be acquired) and education buildings where such project is determined necessary.

Each project is assumed to include its share of costs of bond issuance, architectural, engineering, legal and similar planning costs; construction management; bond project staff and consultants; staff development and training expenses associated with learning construction techniques and approaches and new bond-funded equipment and systems; the furnishing and equipping of all projects, including equipment to maintain facilities in a safe and clean condition; and a customary contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs. Payment of the costs of preparation of facilities planning and project implementation studies, feasibility and assessment reviews, master planning, environmental studies, permit and inspection fees, Division of State Architect (DSA) - related requirements, studies and assessments, including ADA and seismic, and temporary housing and relocation costs for dislocated programs or activities caused or necessitated by projects on the Bond Project List are permissible bond expenditures.

The final cost of each project will be determined as plans are finalized and projects are completed. Based on the final costs of each project, certain of the projects described above may be delayed or may not be completed. Necessary site preparation, grading or restoration may occur in connection with acquisition of property, new construction, modernization, renovation or remodeling, or installation or removal of modular classrooms, including ingress and egress, removing, replacing or installing irrigation, utility lines, trees and landscaping, relocating fire access roads and acquiring any necessary easements, leases, licenses or rights of way to the property, all of which are permitted expenses.

SECTION IV: ADDITIONAL SPECIFICATIONS

No Administrator Salaries. Proceeds from the sale of Bonds authorized by this proposition shall be used only for the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation or replacement of school facilities on the Bond Project List, including the furnishing and equipping of said school facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for said school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries and other school operating expenses as interpreted by applicable law.

Single Purpose. All of the purposes enumerated in this proposition shall be united and voted upon as one single proposition, pursuant to Section 15100 of the California Education Code, and all the enumerated purposes shall constitute the specific single purpose of the bonds and proceeds of the bonds shall be spent only for such purpose.

No Long-Term Debt for Short Lifespan Items. The weighted average maturity of each issue of bonds will not exceed 120 percent (120%) of the average reasonably expected economic life of the projects financed by the bonds, consistent with federal tax law.

Other Terms of the Bonds. The bonds may be issued and sold in several series, and in accordance with a financing plan determined by the Governing Board pursuant to requirements of law. When sold, the bonds shall bear interest at an annual rate not exceeding the statutory maximum and with a maximum term not exceeding the statutory maximum, provided that Bond funds may be used to reimburse the District for Bond Project list expenditures incurred prior to the election and bond issuance, in accordance with federal tax law.

Attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the financial information contained in this measure is based upon the District's projections and estimates only, which are not binding upon the District, nor are the summary or average payment estimates, if any, provided in the Ballot Label. The actual tax rates, debt service and the years in which they will apply may vary from those presently estimated, due to variations from these estimates in the timing of bond sales, the amount of bonds sold and market interest rates at the time of each sale, and actual assessed valuations over the term of repayment of the bonds. The dates of sale and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on need for construction funds and other factors. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold will depend on the bond market at the time of each sale. Actual future assessed valuation will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

The problem with going into debt for new facilities and building upgrades is that nothing is set aside to maintain them once built. Bonds cannot be used for maintenance. Where is the commitment from the School Board that it will pay to maintain these new facilities?

Schools may have been build 30-70 years ago, but is the age of a school building a logical reason to acquire debt and higher taxes? The State Capitol is 150 years old. U.C. Berkeley buildings are over 100 years old. Thanks to proper maintenance and incremental upgrades, these landmarks are perfectly safe and technologically modern.

Measure R imposes an additional tax burden on property owners. Tenants will feel this increase too.

Rising prices on groceries, gas, PG&E, etc. are crushing many seniors, disabled and low-income families. Measure R tax would increase their housing costs too! There's no exemption for seniors, disabled or low income. It applies whether you have students in school or not.

Check your time. Many voters vote on their way to work, on their lunch hour, or after work. If you have flexibility in your schedule consider visiting us mid-morning or mid-afternoon to miss the crowds.

If you need assistance...

As a voter, you may bring up to two individuals with you to your polling place to help you cast your ballot, as long as those individuals do not represent your employer or your union. Your polling place will have copies of the ballot in Spanish and Tagalog and may have poll workers ready to assist you who speak Spanish and Tagalog.

Como votante, usted puede traer dos individuos a la estación de votación para que le ayuden a emitir su voto. Sus acompañantes no pueden ser representantes de su empleador o sindicato.
