# Information this week West Nile Virus detection in Fairfield



The Solano County Mosquito Abatement District (SCMAD) has detected the presence of West Nile virus in the city of Fairfield off Smith Drive on October 25. The map below indicates the area where the virus was detected. Residents are advised to take preventive measures to reduce the risk of mosquito bites and protect public

health by inspecting their properties for standing water. SCMAD urges residents to be proactive against mosquitoes by wearing EPAregistered insect repellent. Technicians are carrying out control as necessary in the surrounding areas to reduce the number of mosquitoes and interrupt further transmission of the virus. The District (707) 784-6675 will continue to monitor the area.



### West Nile Information

Transmission: West Nile virus (WNV) spreads when a female mosquito bites an infected bird and then bites a person.

Symptoms: Most people show no symptoms. Some may have fever, headaches, and body aches. Severe cases can lead to hospitalization and, rarely, death. If you have symptoms, contact your healthcare provider.

High-Risk Groups: Elderly people and those with chronic conditions (diabetes, high blood pressure, cancer, kidney disease) are at higher risk for serious complications.

### **Preventing West Nile Virus**

To reduce mosquito breeding on your property:

Check for standing water. Drain standing water. Empty items like flowerpots, planter dish, pet dishes, buckets, and old tires. Clean regularly, wash bird baths and pet bowls weekly. Repair leaky faucets and broken sprinkler heads. Avoid over-watering. Ensure window and door screens are intact, have no holes, and fit well. Keep swimming pools at proper water levels for circulation and filtration. Request free mosquito fish for neglected pools, ornamental ponds, water troughs, and other artificial water bodies.

### Ride Free to Vote 2024



We're free to vote, SolTrans is Free to Ride. Ride free all day on Tuesday, November 5 on all local and paratransit service

SolTrans, which operates in the cities of Vallejo and Benicia, will offer free rides on all local and paratransit services on **Election Day**, **Tuesday**, **November 5**, to help community members access the polls.

Exercising the right to vote is so important, that SolTrans wants to make it as easy as possible to get to the polls. Free rides will be on all local routes for all riders, and paratransit trips will be free for all ADA-eligible persons. Reservations are required for Paratransit service, please follow normal protocol to book a paratransit trip on or before November 1.

To find your Solano County polling place and check your voter status, visit <u>Solano County Registrar Voters</u>. Riders can plan their travel early.

For help planning your trip, customers can plan a trip with SolTrans' <u>trip planner</u>. Be ready to provide the starting address and the address of the polling place you will be traveling to.

### Bridge toll hikes are coming

Drivers who cross the Bay Area's seven state-owned bridges—including the Carquinez and Benicia-Martinez bridges in Solano County—could see a series of annual toll hikes for bridge maintenance lasting into 2030.

These proposed increases <u>are</u> <u>separate</u> from the recent toll hikes for transportation projects that voters approved in 2018 (Regional Measure 3). One-way tolls are currently \$7 and are slated to rise to \$8 in January.



considering increasing tolls on the region's seven state-owned bridges by 50 cents a year from 2026 through 2030. Tolls were already set to increase to \$8 for all bridges on Jan. 1, 2025. Under the proposal, on Jan. 1, 2026, tolls would rise to \$8.50. On Jan. 1, 2027, tolls would rise to \$9 for those with FasTrak transponders, \$8.25 for those with license plate accounts, and \$10 for other drivers. On Jan. 1, 2028, tolls would rise to \$9.50 for those with FasTrak transponders, \$9.75 for those with license plate accounts, and \$10.50 for other drivers. On Jan. 1, 2029, tolls would rise to \$10 for those with FasTrak transponders, \$10.25 for those with license plate accounts, and \$11 for other drivers. On Jan. 1, 2030, tolls would rise to \$10.50 for those with FasTrak transponders, \$10.75 for those with license plate accounts, and \$11.50 for other drivers.

The Bay Area Toll Authority has borrowed \$56 million since 2021 to pay for bridge preservation. Borrowing another \$600 million over the next five years would result in having to pay back \$690 million, including interest, according to the report.

Drivers paid a toll of 40 cents on the Carquinez and Benicia-Martinez bridges in the late 1980s, or \$1.04 in today's money. That was before a series of voter-approved increases for transportation projects and authority-approved increases for seismic retrofitting.

People can weigh in on the proposed toll increases during a comment period that begins Monday, Nov. 4 and continues through 5 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 3. They can send comments to <u>info@bayareametro.gov</u>

The toll authority and MTC will host a public webinar from 6:30 to 8 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 13 to present details about the proposed toll hike.

The two agencies will hold a public hearing at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 20 in San Francisco. Members of the public will be able to participate in person or via Zoom.



This was adopted by the Bay Area Toll Authority, so the public does not get to vote on the increases. This is the time to make your voice heard!

### City Streets, County Roads Stuck in Neutral as Middling Pavement Quality Prevails Across Bay Area



From the Metropolitan Transportation Commission:

Overall pavement conditions on the Bay Area's 44,000 lane-miles

of local streets and roads landed once again in fair territory last year, with the typical stretch of roadway showing serious wear and likely to require rehabilitation soon. Data released today by the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) put the region's 2023 pavement condition index (PCI) score at 67 out of a maximum possible 100 points, as computed on a three-year moving average basis. This marks the ninth consecutive year Bay Area streets and roads have registered an average score of 67.

"Napa County's improvement is an encouraging sign," said MTC Chair and Napa County Supervisor Alfredo Pedroza, referring to a seven-point jump in the one-year PCI score for roads in unincorporated portions of the county to 52 last year from 45 in 2022 and a three-year moving average that rose to 48 from 45. "But our county roadways are still among the lowest rated in the Bay Area and MTC's goal of having all the region's streets and roads in a state of good repair is proving to be frustratingly hard to reach. The good news is that city and county public works teams have been able to prevent large-scale deterioration. We're even seeing big improvements in some places. The bad news is there's still so far to go."

PCI scores of 90 or higher are considered "excellent." These are newly built or resurfaced streets that show little or no distress. Pavement with a PCI score in the 80 to 89 range is considered "very good" and shows only slight or moderate distress, requiring primarily preventive maintenance. The "good" category ranges from 70 to 79, while streets with PCI scores in the "fair" (60-69) range are becoming worn to the point where rehabilitation may be needed to prevent rapid deterioration. Because major repairs cost five to 10 times more than routine maintenance, these streets are at an especially critical stage.

Roadways with PCI scores of 50 to 59 are deemed "at-risk," while those with PCI scores of 25 to 49 are considered "poor." These roads require major rehabilitation or reconstruction. Pavement with a PCI score below 25 is considered "failed."

San José, which has by far the largest street network in the Bay Area at nearly 4,500 lane-miles, climbed into the "good" range last year with a three-year moving average score of 71, up two points from 69 in the 2020-22 period. San Francisco's three-year moving average score held steady at 74 last year. Oakland's three-year moving average rose by three points to 57, but the city's single-year score fell by a point to 56 from 57 in 2022.

The Sonoma County city of Petaluma achieved the biggest one-year PCI gains of any Bay Area jurisdiction last year, with its 393 lanemiles of city streets registering a score of 55 (at-risk) for 2023, up 12 points from 43 (poor) the year before.

Besides Petaluma and unincorporated Napa County, other communities with big year-over-year improvements in their PCI scores include Cotati, which rose eight points to 74 (good) last year from 66 (fair) in 2022; Moraga, which recorded a five-point increase to 76 from 71; and Dixon, Larkspur, Richmond and St. Helena, each of which boosted their one-year scores by four points. Larkspur's one-year PCI score for 2023 now ranks as the highest of any Bay Area municipality at 89 and its three-year moving average score of 83 is tied with Orinda and Palo Alto at the top of the Bay Area charts. Larkspur as recently as 2017 registered one-year scores in the "poor" range but twice in recent years passed local sales tax measures dedicated to rehabilitating the city's 65 lane-miles of streets.

Six Bay Area municipalities registered three-year PCI scores in the "very good" range for the 2021-2023 period. These include Larkspur, Orinda and Palo Alto (83); Cupertino (82); and Hillsborough and unincorporated Solano County (81). Jurisdictions with three-year PCI scores in the "poor" range include Vallejo (45) and Pacifica (47) as well as Petaluma and unincorporated Napa County (48).

# Notice for Retailers accepting SNAP EBT **Benefits**

Electronic benefit theft continues to be a significant problem, preventing EBT cardholders from accessing their benefits.

To reduce electronic benefit theft in California, the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) will upgrade magnetic stripe only EBT cards to a more secure Chip/Europay, Mastercard, and Visa (EMV) and Tap Pay (Chip EMV/Tap) technology card.

SNAP EBT Chip and Tap cards are coming mid-January 2025, and retailers must take action to be able to continue to process EBT transactions at Point of Sale (POS) terminals.

California is leading the nation as the first state to enable the integration of Chip EMV/Tap technology to improve EBT card security and increase the protection of food and cash benefits.


# Medicare Open Enrollment

Congressman John Garamendi is reminding persons that Medicare Open Enrollment is now underway and runs through December 7.

From Congressman Garamendi:

"In 2022, I proudly voted to pass the Inflation Reduction Act, empowering Medicare the power to negotiate lower prescription drug prices and reduce healthcare costs for seniors.

As your voice in Congress, I am committed to fighting for universal



healthcare and protecting Americans' existing healthcare rights. I'm excited to share the progress we've made to improve our community's access to healthcare.

Thanks to the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), Medicare now has the authority to negotiate lower prescription drug prices. Beginning in January, total out-of-pocket costs for prescription drugs will be capped at \$2,000 annually, ensuring seniors never pay more than

that for medications covered under Medicare, including those used to treat cancer and chronic illnesses.


The IRA also caps the cost of insulin for seniors with diabetes at \$35 a month. In California's 8th District, approximately 74,000 individuals living with diabetes, and 20,000 rely on daily insulin. Medicare beneficiaries who depend on insulin are now saving an average of \$320 annually compared to 2020 prices.

In 2010, I voted to pass the Affordable Care Act, which has helped tens of millions of Americans access affordable, high-quality health insurance. As of 2024, about 26,000 of my constituents are enrolled in the Affordable Care Act marketplace, a <u>16%</u> increase since 2020. Thanks to the IRA, the average enrollee will save <u>\$2,630</u> in premiums this year. Without the IRA's enhanced subsidies, the average premium would have increased <u>117%</u>, to an average of <u>\$4,870</u>.

I encourage every senior in our community to take advantage of these new, lower-cost Medicare benefits. It is more important than ever to look at your drug coverage for 2025 during Medicare Open Enrollment and make sure you are enrolled in the Medicare Part D plan that is best for you. ### **Teach the Election**


California History-Social Science Project is offering classroom-ready resources for the 2024 Election.

# Fairfield Forward 2050: Next steps through adoption



The public comment period for Fairfield Forward 2050, consisting of a General Plan Update, Climate Action Plan, and Environmental Impact Report (EIR), closed in September 2024. The Public Drafts remain available on the Fairfield Forward 2050 project website at www.fairfieldforward.com.

Public comments will be published on the project website after Wednesday, October 9.

Responses to Draft General Plan Update and Draft Climate Action Plan comments will be provided in future staff reports for the Planning Commission and City Council. Responses to Draft EIR comments will be provided in the Final EIR.

Next steps through adoption are as follows:

- November 6, 2024: Special meeting of the Planning Commission to review and make a recommendation to the City Council
- **December 3, 2024**: Regular City Council meeting to vote on the adoption of the Fairfield Forward 2050 project

# **General Plan Amendment Public Hearing**



The Solano County Planning Commission will hold a public hearing to consider a General Plan Amendment (G-24-01) to update the Public Health and Safety Chapter of the General Plan.

The updates address recent state requirements for General Plans, including information relating to evacuation routes, minimum road widths and clearances around structures, mapping of known seismic hazards, current flooding and fire risk conditions, hazard mapping, flooding and fire hazard-related policies, a climate change vulnerability assessment, and comprehensively addressing the shortterm and long-term threats posed by climate change.

The project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Sections 15061(B)(3) of the CEQA Guidelines because it has been determined that implementation of the proposed project would not have the potential to cause a significant effect on the environment. (Project Planner: Matt Walsh, 707-784-6765).

### The hearing will be held on Thursday, November 7 at 7 p.m. in the Board of Supervisors Chambers, County Administration Center, 1st Floor, 675 Texas Street, Fairfield.

## Informational Webinar Powering Up Californians: CPUC Energization Timelines

The California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) invites you to an informational webinar to learn how recently adopted energization

timelines and targets will accelerate requests for new and updated electrical service. Energy Division staff will provide an overview of the timelines that are designed to speed up the process to connect new residential and commercial developments, electric vehicle (EV) charging stations, and other loads to the grid, improve utility transparency and accountability, and support the state's economic and electrification goals. A Q&A session will follow the presentation.

Senate Bill 410 (Becker) and Assembly Bill 50 (Wood), enacted in 2023, directed the CPUC to establish energization timelines for new and upgraded electrical service and to establish a process for reporting electrical service delays. Last month, the CPUC approved a decision to establish new energization timelines and targets for the three large electric investor-owned utilities (IOUs) to complete steps in the energization process that they control. The timelines are based on the utilities' energization data from the last five years in addition to party comments submitted in a process that was streamlined to meet a September 30, 2024, statutory deadline.

# Winter Shelter at BayNorth Church of Christ Opens November 1



BayNorth Church of Christ will be providing a winter shelter for city of Fairfield residents who are unhoused.

The winter shelter will operate each night, beginning **November 1**, 2024, through March 31, 2025. The intake process will be from 6:30 to 8 pm and the shelter exit time will be 6 am each morning. Those needing shelter are allowed to line up starting at 6 pm.

The winter shelter will be filled on a first come, first served basis each night with a limited capacity of ten. Individuals needing shelter must be able to independently manage activities of daily living and agree to comply with program guidelines. There will be limited space for personal belongings.

FAST will provide free bus rides to the winter shelter on FAST route 3 from 6 to 7 pm Monday-Friday. Those who need a ride will need to board the bus at the Fairfield Transportation Center and let the driver know they are going to the winter shelter. Exit the bus at Solano Town Center, make a left on Pennsylvania Ave. and walk one block to Bay North Church of Christ.






