



# **Bay Area Air Quality Management District** And California Air Resources Board Fine Valero Refining Co. \$82 Million For Air **Quality Violations**

violation of BAAQMD regulations. This penalty is the largest ever assessed in the Air District's history.

According to BAAQMD, of the total fine amount, over \$64 million dollars are designed to support the local community impacted by the violations. These dollars are to finance projects solely aimed at reducing air pollution exposure, mitigating air pollution impacts and improving public health in areas surrounding the refinery. The process of determining how BAAQMD will allocate those funds is unclear, but city officials have been told these funds will not be given directly to the city. As such it is important to note these funds cannot be used for roads, infrastructure, public facilities, water, wastewater, or essential services such as library, parks, recreation and police programs. Once the process is specified, the city will advocate for determining the distribution of BAAQMD funds through a public process with input from residents, community organizations, elected officials and advocates representing Benicia. The remainder of the penalty will be used to fund BAAQMD's clean air projects throughout the Bay Area.

Benicia Fire Chief Josh Chadwick says "Benicia appreciates BAAQMD and CARB's attention to Valero Refining Co.'s emissions violations and for holding them accountable."

In December of last year, the City Council created a subcommittee of Vice Mayor Scott and Councilmember Birdseye, supported by Fire Department staff, to develop an Industrial Safety Ordinance (ISO) for Benicia. This ordinance aims to reduce the risk of hazardous chemical releases, improve accident prevention, enhance air monitoring, and promote transparency between the community and industry.

Chief Chadwick continues "The draft ISO includes the development of an Industrial Safety Citizen Oversight Commission which would develop programs and initiatives to recommend funding distribution from BAAQMD. In addition, the draft ISO proposes the establishment of a Benicia Air Quality Monitoring Program (AQMP). The major goal of the AQMP is to install air quality monitoring stations throughout the city and publicly disseminate the information through an online portal with real time air quality data. I would like to explore the possibility of using these funds to support the AQMP goals."

In addition to the \$82 million penalty, Valero will be required to undertake several measures to prevent future violations. Valero will be required to reconfigure the facility's main hydrogen vent and vents in its hydrogen production plants to prevent emissions from being released directly into the atmosphere. Valero will also be required to implement a training program to ensure that its staff are fully aware of all relevant BAAQMD regulations.

### **Medicare Open Enrollment**

Congressman John Garamendi is reminding persons that Medicare Open Enrollment is now underway and runs through December 7.

From Congressman Garamendi:

"In 2022, I proudly voted to pass the Inflation Reduction Act, empowering Medicare the power to negotiate lower prescription drug prices and reduce healthcare costs for seniors.



As your voice in Congress, I am committed to fighting for universal healthcare and protecting Americans' existing healthcare rights. I'm excited to share the progress we've made to improve our community's access to healthcare.

Thanks to the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), Medicare now has the authority to negotiate lower prescription drug prices. Beginning in January, total out-of-pocket costs for prescription drugs will be capped at \$2,000 annually, ensuring seniors never pay more than that for medications covered under Medicare, including those used to treat cancer and chronic illnesses.

The IRA also caps the cost of insulin for seniors with diabetes at \$35 a month. In California's 8th District, approximately <u>74,000</u> individuals living with diabetes, and <u>20,000</u> rely on daily insulin. Medicare beneficiaries who depend on insulin are now saving an average of <u>\$320</u> annually compared to 2020 prices.

In 2010, I voted to pass the Affordable Care Act, which has helped tens of millions of Americans access affordable, high-quality health insurance. As of 2024, about 26,000 of my constituents are enrolled in the Affordable Care Act marketplace, a 16% increase since 2020. Thanks to the IRA, the average enrollee will save \$2,630 in premiums this year. Without the IRA's enhanced subsidies, the average premium would have increased 117%, to an average of \$4,870.

I encourage every senior in our community to take advantage of these new, lower-cost Medicare benefits. It is more important than ever to look at your drug coverage for 2025 during Medicare Open Enrollment and make sure you are enrolled in the Medicare Part D plan that is best for you. #### Bridge toll hikes are coming



Drivers who cross the Bay Area's seven state-owned bridges—including the Carquinez and Benicia-Martinez bridges in Solano County—could see a series of annual toll hikes for bridge maintenance lasting into 2030.

These proposed increases <u>are</u> <u>separate</u> from the recent toll hikes for transportation projects that voters approved in 2018 (Regional Measure 3). One-way tolls are currently \$7 and are slated to rise to \$8 in January.

The Bay Area Toll Authority is considering increasing tolls on the region's seven state-owned bridges by 50 cents a year from 2026 through 2030. Tolls were already set to increase to \$8 for all bridges on Jan. 1, 2025. Under the proposal, on Jan. 1, 2026, tolls would rise to \$8.50. On Jan. 1, 2027, tolls would rise to \$9 for those with FasTrak transponders, \$8.25 for those with license plate accounts, and \$10 for other drivers. On Jan. 1, 2028, tolls would rise to \$9.50 for those with FasTrak transponders, \$9.75 for those with license plate accounts, and \$10.50 for other drivers. On Jan. 1, 2029, tolls would rise to \$10 for those with FasTrak transponders, \$10.25 for those with license plate accounts, and \$11 for other drivers. On Jan. 1, 2030, tolls would rise to \$10.50 for those with FasTrak transponders, \$10.75 for those with license plate accounts, and \$11.50 for other drivers.

The Bay Area Toll Authority has borrowed \$56 million since 2021 to pay for bridge preservation. Borrowing another \$600 million over the next five years would result in having to pay back \$690 million, including interest, according to the report.

Drivers paid a toll of 40 cents on the Carquinez and Benicia-Martinez bridges in the late 1980s, or \$1.04 in today's money. That was before a series of voter-approved increases for transportation projects and authority-approved increases for seismic retrofitting.

People can weigh in on the proposed toll increases during a comment period that begins Monday, Nov. 4 and continues through 5 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 3. They can send comments to <a href="mailto:info@bayareametro.gov">info@bayareametro.gov</a>

The toll authority and MTC will host a <u>public webinar</u> from 6:30 to 8 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 13 to present details about the proposed toll hike.

The two agencies will hold a <u>public hearing</u> at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 20 in San Francisco. Members of the public will be able to participate in person or via Zoom.

This was adopted by the Bay Area Toll Authority, so the public does not get to vote on the increases. This is the time to make your voice heard!



# Isleton Bridge scheduled for daily closures



Caltrans is alerting motorists that beginning next week the Isleton bridge on State Route 160 near the city of Isleton will be under one-way traffic control during daytime hours into the early evening.

The bridge is scheduled for ongoing parts replacements, mechanical and electrical control system upgrades.

#### **BRIDGE WORK SCHEDULE:**

- November 19 to June 30, 2025 daily Monday through Saturday from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.
- No work scheduled from November 27 December 1 due to the Thanksgiving Holiday.

#### **DETOUR:**

- River Road and the Walnut Grove Bridge will be the alternate route.
- No two bridges will be closed at the same time.

Advance signage has been placed at the bridge. Caltrans urges motorists to use this detour or use Interstate 5 in Sacramento County as an alternate route. Motorists should plan accordingly and expect additional travel time.

Current truck restrictions will apply. California legal trucks having a kingpin-to-rear-axle of more than 30 feet are not recommended on State Route 160.

Additional construction is needed to maintain and keep the bridge operational. These delta bridges were originally constructed in the early 1920s and then reconstructed or refurbished in the early 1950s.

Weather conditions could delay or cancel scheduled work. Caltrans advises motorists to "Be Work Zone Alert." # Informational Webinar Powering Up Californians: CPUC Energization Timelines

The California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) invites you to an informational webinar to



learn how recently adopted energization timelines and targets will accelerate requests for new and updated electrical service. Energy Division staff will provide an overview of the timelines that are designed to speed up the process to connect new residential and commercial developments, electric vehicle (EV) charging stations, and other loads to the grid, improve utility transparency and accountability, and support the state's economic and electrification goals. A Q&A session will follow the presentation.

Senate Bill 410 (Becker) and Assembly Bill 50 (Wood), enacted in 2023, directed the CPUC to establish energization timelines for new and upgraded electrical service and to establish a process for reporting electrical service delays. Last month, the CPUC approved a decision to establish new energization timelines and targets for the three large electric investor-owned utilities (IOUs) to complete steps in the energization process that they control. The timelines are based on the utilities' energization data from the last five years in addition to party comments submitted in a process that was streamlined to meet a September 30, 2024, statutory deadline.

# BATA to Host Webinar: Proposed Toll Hike, Carpool Policies



The Bay Area Toll Authority (BATA) is <u>considering a toll increase</u> that would be phased in over five years — beginning Jan. 1, 2026 — and would be used only to pay for the maintenance, rehabilitation

and operation of the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge and the Antioch, Benicia-Martinez, Carquinez, Dumbarton, Richmond-San Rafael and San Mateo-Hayward bridges.

BATA also is considering updates for 2026 to the policies for use of the carpool lanes on bridge approaches. These include extending the three-person occupancy requirement for half-price tolls during weekday commute periods to all seven spans; and allowing two-occupant vehicles to use the carpool lanes on approaches to all bridges except the Bay Bridge. Two-person carpools would not receive the 50 percent discount, but would be able to use the carpool lanes to save time. Because carpool lanes approaching the Bay Bridge are more heavily used than those at other bridges, Bay Bridge carpools still would require at least three occupants.

BATA next Wednesday evening will host a public webinar to present more details about the proposed toll hike and carpool policy changes, and to answer questions from members of the public:



# Probation receives \$337,273 grant from Office of Traffic Safety for intensive supervision program for high-risk DUI offenders

The Solano County Probation Department announced today that it has received a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) for an intensive probation supervision program for high-risk individuals with multiple DUI convictions. The grant program runs through September 2025.

"This grant funding will allow us to address the complex issues surrounding individuals who have multiple DUIs by providing vital resources and guidance to break the cycle of alcohol-related offenses," said Dean Farrah, Chief Probation Officer. "This program is designed to closely monitor and support individuals, helping to reduce repeat offenses and create safer roads by reducing the incidences of impaired driving."

Funding will go toward check-ins with probationers to ensure they follow court-ordered terms of their probation. The grant will also pay for warrant operations targeting probation violations and/or DUI suspects who do not appear in court, alcohol testing, officer training in Standard Field Sobriety Testing (SFST), distribution of DUI "Be on the Lookout" (BOLO) alerts and collaborating with courts and prosecutors to establish probation orders.

"Intensive supervision programs are essential in reducing the harmful impact of DUI offenses," said Barbara Rooney, OTS Director. "This is one important measure to help prevent the tragic consequences of impaired driving and create safer roads for everyone."

Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

# Winter Shelter at BayNorth Church of Christ
