West Point graduate becomes the first woman to complete Army Ranger competition

Congratulations to <u>Gabrielle A.</u>
<u>White</u> – the first female finisher of the U.S. Army's Best Ranger Competition.

First Lt. Gabrielle A. White and her teammate completed the annual three-day competition at Camp Roger in Fort Benning, Georgia, on April 13. White, a 25-year-old West Point graduate, became the first woman to compete and finish the intensive challenge.

The competition, which involves more than 30 events such as combat water survival, bayonet obstacle course, ballistic breaching, helocast, rope bridge, military knots and other physically and mentally taxing skills.

White is an 11A (infantry officer) assigned to the Maneuver Captains Career Course, B Company, 3rd Battalion, 81st Armored

Regiment, 199th Infantry Brigade. She graduated from the United States Military Academy at West Point in May 2021 and completed Ranger School in April 2022. Her past accolades, include "two Army Commendation Medals, National Defense Service Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Army Service Ribbon, Ranger Tab and Air Assault Badge."

The Best Ranger Competition website describes the challenge, launched in 1982, as a grueling competition, starring the best soldiers of the world." Ten years ago, the Army started allowing women to enter U.S. Army Ranger School in 2015 – with Kristen Marie Giest and Shayne Lynne Haver becoming the first two women to graduate that year."

## Governor Newsom announces SUN Bucks Program will provide food to California kids during summer break 2025



A press release from the Governor's Office:

Governor Gavin Newsom announced this week that California will soon be releasing electronic benefits transfer (EBT) cards for the SUN Bucks food program in summer 2025. California was one of the first states in the nation to launch SUN Bucks in the summer of 2024. In its

first year, nearly \$500 million in food purchases were made and the families and caregivers of more than 4.3 million California children activated their SUN Bucks cards. Over 4 million eligible California children will automatically receive SUN Bucks EBT cards that can be used to purchase groceries starting in June, and each eligible child will receive \$120.

#### **How SUN Bucks works**

Most children who qualify for free or reduced-price meals through a school meal application or Universal Benefits Application, or receive CalFresh, CalWORKs, and/or Medi-Cal benefits (certified at or below 185 percent of the Federal Poverty Level), are automatically enrolled.

Children in foster care, experiencing homelessness or attending Head Start are also categorically eligible and are automatically enrolled. Based on California Department of Social Services (CDSS) and California Department of Education (CDE) data, more than 4 million children will be automatically enrolled this year.

Children who are not determined to be automatically eligible may apply by submitting a school meal application or <a href="Universal">Universal</a>
<a href="Benefits Application">Benefits Application</a> to their school or school administrator's office by September 1, 2025, in order to receive SUN Bucks benefits for summer 2025.

SUN Bucks cards for summer 2025 are scheduled to arrive in the mail beginning in June and will continue until mailings are complete. SUN Bucks EBT cards will provide \$120 per child, which is equivalent to \$40 per month for June, July, and August, the three months schools are typically closed.

"We're excited to see SUN Bucks return for the summer of 2025," CDSS Director Jennifer Troia said. "Last year, this program not only helped put food on the table for millions of California families, but it also bolstered local economies where food benefits were spent."

Regardless of when a SUN Bucks EBT card is mailed or received, every card is loaded with the full \$120 per child. Per federal rules, funds must be used within 122 days of the funds being added to the card. Any unused funds on the card will expire after 122 days. Expired benefits cannot be replaced. Participation in SUN Bucks will have no bearing on eligibility for CalFresh or any other public benefit program. Children who receive SUN Bucks may still participate in other summer meal options, such as SUN Meals.

#### Leading the way to fight hunger

California was the first state to implement a statewide Universal Meals Program for schoolchildren, providing all public TK-12 students access to two free meals per school day. In September, Governor Newsom <u>signed legislation</u> to increase enrollment in state food assistance programs, reduce youth consumption of processed foods, and increase access to healthy, locally grown food in all California communities.

First Partner Jennifer Siebel Newsom also championed efforts to develop the innovative California Farm to School initiative.
California Farm to School works in tandem with universal school meals to ensure California students have access to two free school meals that are locally-sourced, delicious, and nutritious. California also participates in the federal SUN Bucks food program which ensures that children in families with low incomes have adequate nutrition while school is out for the summer.

### About the SUN Bucks program

In December 2022, Congress passed the <u>Consolidated</u>

<u>Appropriations Act of 2023</u>, which created a new, permanent

Summer EBT program for states to provide food benefits to families

beginning in 2024. In July 2023, California passed Assembly Bill 120, establishing the CDSS as the lead implementing agency, in partnership with CDE, to maximize Summer EBT program participation for summer 2024. This program is being rolled-out in many parts of the country.

Due to the large number of automatically enrolled children, SUN Bucks EBT card issuances will occur in two stages:

- Stage 1: Automatically enrolled children will begin receiving their cards in early June through July 2025. Cards will be mailed in alphabetical order according to the child's last name.
- Stage 2: Children determined eligible after the start of Stage 1 will begin receiving their cards in September 2025 until mailings are complete.

## We Hear You: Amid Growing Social Security Disruption Concerns, Attorney General Bonta Launches New Complaint Page

From California Attorney General Rob Bonta:

California Attorney General Bonta this week announced the launch of a new webpage to allow Californians to report any disruptions they've experienced to their Social Security benefits.



"Your social security benefits should not be impacted by President Trump and Elon Musk's cuts to federal funding and programs," **said Attorney General Bonta.** "If you experience any disruptions to your social security benefits, I want to know. Please report any disruptions to my office using the form found at oag.ca.gov/socialsecurity."

Within the last months, chaotic changes and disruptions within the Social Security Administration have caused issues for people trying

to access their benefits, including reported website outages, difficulty accessing online accounts, and potential delays in benefits. These issues are largely attributed to changes including a cut to 12% of the Social Security workforce, potential gutting of its phone services, and the closure of field offices. The California Department of Justice is committed to protecting Californians from unlawful actions by the Trump Administration which should not impede access to federal entitlement programs — including social security benefits.

While the California Department of Justice does not represent individuals, this information is vital to ascertaining the impact of federal actions on California and aiding with any potential future action by the state. ## 56-Hour Closures scheduled to begin in March for Rio Vista Bridge



From a Caltrans press release:

Caltrans is advising motorists of six scheduled weekend closures of the Rio Vista Bridge (Helen Madere Memorial Bridge) on State Route 12 (SR 12) for ongoing repairs.

This \$27.2 million project is funded through the Bridge Rehabilitation and Replacement Program and will require multiple 56-hour weekend closures for the work to be completed because of the limited width of the bridge to allow for heavy equipment access.

The project is making necessary mechanical repairs, replacing the movable deck span and replacing bridge rails.

During the weekend closures that are scheduled between March and June, the contractor will replace the movable span bridge deck

concrete, and 60 steel stringers needed to extend the service life of the bridge.

Due to the limited width of the exiting bridge deck, 56-hour weekend bridge closures are necessary to facilitate safe access to the work for contractor and Caltrans personnel.

The 56-hour weekend bridge closure schedule will lessen total project workdays and help avoid the wait times at peak commute hours during the week.

Motorists could encounter additional travel times of up to two hours using detours from Rio Vista to Sacramento County on SR 12 across the Sacramento River. Please allow for extra travel time to reach your destination, especially for scheduled appointments and work schedules.

## Virus that causes polio-like illness found in Bay Area as influenza cases spike

Get your gallon of hand sanitizer out from underneath the kitchen sink, because while COVID-19 levels may be low, a slew of other respiratory illnesses are riding high in the Bay Area.

According to recent data from <u>WastewaterScan</u>, a Stanford-run program that tracks viral traces in local wastewater, levels of influenza B — a virus that causes similar symptoms as the flu — were prevalent throughout virtually the entire region as of Tuesday morning. But for local infectious diseases experts, this information comes as no surprise: This past February, they remarked that California experienced one of the <u>worst flu surges of the century</u>, which led to an increased number of deaths and hospitalizations.

## Proposed Federal Budget Jeopardizes Vital Programs for Older Adults



Last week, we warned of proposed federal cuts to Medicaid and SNAP—lifeline programs relied upon every

day by older and disabled adults, caregivers and families in Napa and Solano counties. If enacted, these cuts would strip away critical healthcare and nutrition services.

Now, we face another alarming development.

The Trump Administration's leaked FY 2026 budget proposes dismantling the **Older Americans Act (OAA)**. Established nearly 60 years ago, the OAA has long provided essential support to help older adults live safely and independently at home. Such support includes:

- Home delivery meal services and congregate meal programs
- In-home care and caregiver respite
- Transportation to medical appointments
- Elder abuse prevention

The proposed changes would shift OAA programs to agencies not designed to manage them and significantly reduce or eliminate funding for several services altogether. As USAging's CEO Sandy Markwood says, "By breaking apart this vital program, the Trump Administration is undermining the federal commitment to assist older Americans in aging well at home."

## USDA withdraws proposal to reduce Salmonella in poultry

The US Department of Agriculture (USDA) has withdrawn a proposed rule aimed at reducing *Salmonella* illnesses linked to raw poultry products.

The <u>withdrawal</u> of the *Salmonella* Framework for Raw Poultry Products, which was proposed by the Biden administration in August 2024, was posted today in the *Federal Register* by the USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS).

The federal government is reversing the termination of legal status for international students around the U.S. after many filed court challenges against the Trump administration crackdown, a government lawyer said Friday.


The records in a federal student database maintained by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement had been terminated in recent weeks, often without the students or their schools being notified. Judges around the country had already issued orders temporarily restoring the students' records in dozens of lawsuits challenging the terminations.

## Vallejo PD to host community town hall meeting




The Vallejo Police Department (VPD) is inviting the community to attend an upcoming Community Town Hall meeting on **Thursday**,

## Speaker Series: Dr. Tom Snyder – Mare Island Naval Hospital (1864–1957)



## State Route 37 and Fairgrounds Dr. interchange



Work has begun on the state route 37 and Fairgrounds Dr. interchange in North Vallejo, according to the city of Vallejo.

The Solano Transportation Authority (STA), in partnership with the city of Vallejo, Caltrans, and Solano County, is leading construction on the State Route 37/Fairgrounds Drive Interchange Improvements Project. This project will include roadway improvements along portions of Fairgrounds Drive and Redwood Parkway/Redwood Street, as well as several nearby intersections and interchanges within the City of Vallejo. Specifically, this project will widen and improve 1.5 miles of Fairgrounds Drive, extending from the State Route 37 interchange to the Redwood Parkway/Interstate 80 Interchange. The project will implement a Diverging Diamond Interchange design that will significantly improve traffic flow and safety, while reducing congestion and greenhouse gas emissions. At the end of the project, it will be both safer and easier for motorists, pedestrians, and cyclists to access and navigate.

The project supports Solano 360, a larger county wide economic development to revitalize the area and encourage economic growth and development. This includes a mobility hub at the Fairgrounds site, which is funded by One Bay Area Grant Cycle 3OBAG-3 and various grants provided by the STA to the County, who is the project sponsor. Improvements will also be made to a number of intersections and interchanges, including Redwood Street/Parkway and Interstate 80, Fairgrounds Drive and State Route 37. This project will relieve congestion and improve traffic flow on local streets, improve the existing interchange and intersection operations, improve the safety of local streets, and increase capacity of the local roadway network to support future growth.



"Access to fast, reliable internet has become essential for work, education, healthcare, and staying connected," said John M. Vasquez, District 4 Supervisor. "This project helps ensure more of our rural county residents have the tools they need to participate fully in modern life."

The Dixon tower is part of a cutting-edge 6 GHz network utilizing Tarana Wireless' next-generation fixed wireless access (ngFWA) technology. This advanced system is designed to deliver fast, reliable internet to communities currently underserved by federal infrastructure programs. Developed by Cal.net, the network will include seven new towers aimed at reaching residents who have long lacked consistent and affordable broadband access.

"We are very excited to partner with Solano County and bring fast reliable internet to residents within the County," said Craig Stein,


Cal.net CEO. "Once complete, residents can expect download speeds of up to 400 Mbps and upload speeds of up to 100 Mbps, depending on location and line-of-sight conditions."

As part of this initiative, Solano County is covering full hookup costs for up to 800 eligible rural households on a first-come, first-served basis. This includes customer equipment, an indoor Wi-Fi router, professional installation, and service activation—at no cost to the resident. Funded by the County's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) allocation, the project supports the construction of seven broadband towers in unincorporated areas, reinforcing Solano County's commitment to expanding high-speed internet access where it's needed most.

"Tarana is proud to support this important initiative with Cal.net," said Carl Guardino, Tarana's VP of Government Affairs and Public Policy. "Solano County is a perfect example of the underserved communities our ngFWA technology was designed to reach."

## New Traffic Pattern for Southbound West 7th Street Traffic at Military West




From the city of Benicia:

On Monday, April 21 there will be a new traffic pattern for southbound traffic on West 7th Street at Military West. Vehicles traveling southbound on West 7th Street will be able to turn left (eastbound) onto Military West from either the right or left lane. Thru traffic on West 7th Street will now be from the right lane. Vehicles must be in the right lane to continue onto West 7th Street and to access the businesses on the south side of the intersection. Line extensions (dashed white lines) will be added in the intersection to guide the left turning traffic. Do not cross these dashed lines within the intersection.

Please use caution and slow down when navigating this intersection. The purpose of these improvements is to increase southbound vehicle volume, thus reducing phase durations and wait times at this traffic signal.

## BayNorth Winter Shelter's final month and overall impact



From the city of Fairfield:

During the final (for the season) month of operation, there was an overall 101% utilization rate for the month with an average of eight unhoused residents utilizing the BayNorth's Winter Shelter for at least one night.

Seventy-seven percent of those nights were utilized by unhoused males and 23% were utilized by unhoused females. Two of the participants using the winter shelter during the month of March secured a permanent housing solution.

Over the five months the winter shelter was open, BayNorth assisted 78 unhoused residents who have used the program at least one night. There was an overall 80% utilization rate (1,202 total beds total).


Participants were provided with a shower, a hot meal, a warm and safe place to rest for the night, and some food to take with them to go in the morning. Additionally, clothing, hygiene items and linkages

to other support services were provided.

Overall, six unhoused residents moved into longer term housing solutions with three moving into temporary housing and three moving into permanent housing.

We thank BayNorth Church of Christ for their partnership and in providing these services to our unhoused community this winter.

First 5 Solano Community Responsive Mini Grants are now open for activities occurring July 1, 2025, to June 30, 2026.



First 5 Solano has now created a more flexible way to fund your event(s) or activity(ies). Grants will provide \$500-\$5,000 based on your needs and proposed ideas. First 5 Solano Mini Grants can fund things such as:

 Community Engagement Events: For one-time events or activities, Community Responsive Mini Grants can provide up to \$500 per event to connect with parents, caregivers and/or providers to increase awareness about a topic or resource available in the community. Examples: Community baby shower or early literacy lap read.

- Professional Development Opportunity: For Professional Development Opportunities, such as hosting or attending conferences or training, Community Responsive Mini Grants can provide up to \$3,000 per event, to strengthen the skills of Solano County providers for children ages 0-5. Professional Development Opportunities may be one-time (such as a one-day training) or over a time-period (such as a weekly training over 6 weeks). Examples: Lactation Education Certification training or Trauma Informed Care conference.
- Material and Equipment Purchase: Community Responsive Mini Grants can be used to support the purchase of equipment or materials up to \$5,000 to provide assistance for specific activities or services to children ages 0-5 and their families. 



## **Bay Area Butterfly Festival**



Monarch butterflies play a crucial role in regulating our ecosystems and pollinating plants — including the crops we rely on for food. One out of every three bites of food we eat is thanks to pollinators like the Monarch butterfly. Without pollinators, our entire food web could unravel.

After two years of counts averaging 116,000 Western Monarch butterflies, only 5,407 of these orange-and-black beauties were counted in their winter groves during the most recent winter. (Data from Xerces Society.) This population count shows a heartbreaking decline of 95% for Monarchs, who are dying off due to pesticides and habitat loss.

You can learn more about Monarchs and how to support them at the Bay Area Butterfly Festival on **Sunday**, **June 1 at the Mare Island Promenade in Vallejo from 10 a.m. - 5 p.m.** There will be fun for the entire family, with interactive stations, presentations, music, vendors, arts and crafts, food & drinks, and more!
