Governor Newsom announces SUN Bucks Program will provide food to California kids during summer break 2025

A press release from the Governor's Office:

Governor Gavin Newsom announced this week that California will soon be releasing electronic benefits transfer (EBT) cards for the SUN Bucks food program in summer 2025. California was one of the first states in the nation to launch SUN Bucks in the summer of 2024. In



its first year, nearly \$500 million in food purchases were made and the families and caregivers of more than 4.3 million California children activated their SUN Bucks cards. Over 4 million eligible California children will automatically receive SUN Bucks EBT cards that can be used to purchase groceries starting in June, and each eligible child will receive \$120.

How SUN Bucks works

Most children who qualify for free or reduced-price meals through a school meal application or Universal Benefits Application, or receive CalFresh, CalWORKs, and/or Medi-Cal benefits (certified at or below 185 percent of the Federal Poverty Level), are automatically enrolled.

Children in foster care, experiencing homelessness or attending Head Start are also categorically eligible and are automatically enrolled. Based on California Department of Social Services (CDSS) and California Department of Education (CDE) data, more than 4 million children will be automatically enrolled this year.

Children who are not determined to be automatically eligible may apply by submitting a school meal application or <u>Universal</u> <u>Benefits Application</u> to their school or school administrator's office by September 1, 2025, in order to receive SUN Bucks benefits for summer 2025.

SUN Bucks cards for summer 2025 are scheduled to arrive in the mail beginning in June and will continue until mailings are complete. SUN Bucks EBT cards will provide \$120 per child, which is equivalent to \$40 per month for June, July, and August, the three months schools are typically closed.

"We're excited to see SUN Bucks return for the summer of 2025," CDSS Director Jennifer Troia said. "Last year, this program not only helped put food on the table for millions of California families, but it also bolstered local economies where food benefits were spent."

Regardless of when a SUN Bucks EBT card is mailed or received, every card is loaded with the full \$120 per child. Per federal rules, funds must be used within 122 days of the funds being added to the card. Any unused funds on the card will expire after 122 days. Expired benefits cannot be replaced. Participation in SUN Bucks will have no bearing on eligibility for CalFresh or any other public benefit program. Children who receive SUN Bucks may still participate in other summer meal options, such as <u>SUN Meals</u>.

Leading the way to fight hunger

California was the first state to implement a statewide Universal Meals Program for schoolchildren, providing all public TK-12 students access to two free meals per school day. In September, Governor Newsom <u>signed legislation</u> to increase enrollment in state food assistance programs, reduce youth consumption of processed foods, and increase access to healthy, locally grown food in all California communities. First Partner Jennifer Siebel Newsom also championed efforts to develop the innovative California Farm to School initiative. California Farm to School works in tandem with universal school meals to ensure California students have access to two free school meals that are locally-sourced, delicious, and nutritious. California also participates in the federal SUN Bucks food program which ensures that children in families with low incomes have adequate nutrition while school is out for the summer.

About the SUN Bucks program

In December 2022, Congress passed the <u>Consolidated</u> <u>Appropriations Act of 2023</u>, which created a new, permanent Summer EBT program for states to provide food benefits to families beginning in 2024. In July 2023, California passed <u>Assembly Bill</u> <u>120</u>, establishing the CDSS as the lead implementing agency, in partnership with CDE, to maximize Summer EBT program participation for summer 2024. This program is being <u>rolled-out in</u> <u>many parts of the country</u>.

Due to the large number of automatically enrolled children, SUN Bucks EBT card issuances will occur in two stages:

- Stage 1: Automatically enrolled children will begin receiving their cards in early June through July 2025. Cards will be mailed in alphabetical order according to the child's last name.
- Stage 2: Children determined eligible after the start of Stage 1 will begin receiving their cards in September 2025 until mailings are complete.

We Hear You: Amid Growing Social Security Disruption Concerns, Attorney General Bonta Launches New Complaint Page



From California Attorney General Rob Bonta:

California Attorney General Bonta this week announced the launch of a new <u>webpage</u> to allow Californians to report any disruptions they've experienced to their Social Security benefits.

"Your social security benefits should not be impacted by President Trump and Elon Musk's cuts to federal funding and programs," **said Attorney General Bonta.** "If you experience any disruptions to your social security benefits, I want to know. Please report any disruptions to my office using the form found at <u>oag.ca.gov/socialsecurity</u>."

Within the last months, chaotic changes and disruptions within the Social Security Administration have caused issues for people trying to access their benefits, including reported website outages, difficulty accessing online accounts, and potential delays in benefits. These issues are largely attributed to changes including a cut to 12% of the Social Security workforce, potential gutting of its phone services, and the closure of field offices. The California Department of Justice is committed to protecting Californians from unlawful actions by the Trump Administration which should not impede access to federal entitlement programs — including social security benefits.

While the California Department of Justice does not represent individuals, this information is vital to ascertaining the impact of federal actions on California and aiding with any potential future action by the state. 56-Hour Closures scheduled to begin in March for Rio Vista Bridge



From a Caltrans press release:

Caltrans is advising motorists of six scheduled weekend closures of the Rio Vista Bridge (Helen Madere Memorial Bridge) on State Route 12 (SR 12) for ongoing repairs.

This \$27.2 million project is funded through the Bridge Rehabilitation and Replacement Program and will require multiple 56-hour weekend closures for the work to be completed because of the limited width of the bridge to allow for heavy equipment access.

The project is making necessary mechanical repairs, replacing the movable deck span and replacing bridge rails.

During the weekend closures that are scheduled between March and June, the contractor will replace the movable span bridge deck concrete, and 60 steel stringers needed to extend the service life of the bridge.

Due to the limited width of the exiting bridge deck, 56-hour weekend bridge closures are necessary to facilitate safe access to the work for contractor and Caltrans personnel.

The 56-hour weekend bridge closure schedule will lessen total project workdays and help avoid the wait times at peak commute hours during the week.

Motorists could encounter additional travel times of up to two hours using detours from Rio Vista to Sacramento County on SR 12 across the Sacramento River. Please allow for extra travel time to reach your destination, especially for scheduled appointments and work schedules.

Caltrans District 3 is responsible for maintaining and operating 4,385 lane miles in 11 Sacramento Valley and Northern Sierra counties. Caltrans reminds motorists to "Be Work Zone Alert" and slow in construction zones for the safety of travelers and crews performing these improvements.

Interstate 80 Scheduled for Multiple Closures in Yolo County

From a Caltrans press release:

Caltrans is alerting motorists of an upcoming extended connector and on-ramp closure for the ongoing Yolo Interstate 80 (I-80) and U.S. Highway 50 (US-50) Pavement Rehabilitation Project.

The mainline between I-80/US-50 connector ramp to Reed Avenue will be reduced to two lanes after the end of a 55-hour closure from May 12 through May 21.

Construction work will include a full closure of eastbound (EB) I-80 after crossing the EB I-80 Yolo Causeway from Davis going towards Reed Avenue in West Sacramento. Caltrans urges motorists to plan for additional travel time, to expect delays and use the designated detour route. (see maps)

Ongoing pavement replacement and striping work will continue for the EB direction of I-80 and US 50 in West Sacramento.

 EB I-80 traffic will be detoured to EB US-50 to Sacramento over the Sacramento River to northbound I-5 to Redding (EXIT 4A), to east I-80 to Reno (EXIT 522). • From WB US-50, take the Enterprise Boulevard off-ramp (EXIT 81) and stay left, continue onto Enterprise to Industrial Avenue (left turn at light) continue Industrial to Harbor Boulevard (left at light) for EB US-50 to Sacramento (EXIT 82), continue over Sacramento River to northbound I-5 to Redding (EXIT 4A), to eastbound I-80 to Reno (EXIT 522).

SCHEDULED CLOSURE #2:

- Reed Avenue loop on-ramp to EB I-80 closed
- **72-hour full closure** from 5 a.m. Monday, May 12 through 5 a.m. Thursday, May 21

DETOUR FOR CLOSURE #2:

• From Reed Avenue, continue west on Reed, (left turn at signal) take westbound I-80 to the San Francisco on-ramp, to EB US-50 to Sacramento (EXIT 82), continue over the Sacramento River to northbound I-5 to Redding (EXIT 4A), to east I-80 to Reno (EXIT 522).

The work zone is from the Yolo Causeway through West Sacramento on I-80 and US 50. The speed limit has been reduced to 55 miles per hour 24/7 for the safety of workers and motorists. Work is scheduled to begin as listed but subject to change due to traffic incidents, weather conditions, availability of equipment and/or materials, and construction-related issues.

The extended lane closures will help to minimize the duration of the work and improve workers' safety.

This \$280 million project includes \$47 million from Senate Bill (SB 1), the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017. SB 1 provides \$5 billion in transportation funding annually, shared equally between state and local agencies. Road projects progress through construction phases more quickly based on the availability of SB 1 funds, including projects partially funded by SB 1.

Air District Soliciting Applications for Community Advisory Council Seats



The Air District is soliciting applications for thirteen seats on its Community Advisory Council (CAC). The thirteen open seats represent: Alameda County, Contra Costa County, San Francisco County, San Mateo County, Santa Clara County, and Solano County, as well as

at-large and youth seats.

In November 2021, the Board of Directors approved the formation of the Air District's inaugural CAC, consisting of 17 community members from across the Bay Area. The Board created the CAC in response to community input and to support an equity-forward policy agenda. The CAC provides guidance to the Board of Directors on programs and policies that impact all communities, including overburdened communities.

The CAC reflects the diversity of the Bay Area and lived experiences in communities heavily impacted by air pollution. The CAC is composed of individuals with diverse skill sets and a range of relevant knowledge and technical expertise. This includes, but is not limited to, individuals who reflect the diverse demographics of the Bay Area and/or have been or are impacted by air pollution, as well as individuals who utilize community-centered approaches and have expertise and knowledge on air quality issues.

The CAC meets bi-monthly in person and members are expected to:

- Review materials for CAC meetings and participate during the meetings;
- Attend required trainings;
- Join at least one ad hoc committee every year, except CAC leadership;
- Perform all other duties as prescribed by the Charter, including following Civility expectations.

Council Members are compensated \$500 for attending the bimonthly CAC meetings and \$75 per hour for other meetings.

These fraudulent texts generally try to impersonate the toll service in each state. For example, if you live in California, the text will likely mention the DMV or FastTrak, California's electronic toll collection.

Women Have Served in Combat Roles for a Decade. The Pentagon is Reopening the Debate

In Army Ranger school, Emelie Vanasse once sat under a poncho in the pouring rain and shivered so hard her entire body cramped up. She strapped on a rucksack that weighed more than 100 pounds and climbed a mountain. Deep in the middle of the woods, she hallucinated a donut shop.

When <u>Capt. Kristen Griest and 1st Lt. Shaye Haver became the</u> <u>first women to make it through Ranger training</u> in 2015, Vanasse had taped their pictures above her desk.

"I'm next," she told herself then. "It's gonna be me."

Less than two years later, she woke up at three a.m., shaved her head—one-quarter inch all around—and drove to Camp Rogers, Georgia, to endure 62 days of crawling through the mud, rappelling down mountainsides, and leading fellow soldiers in training raids and ambushes while hungry and sleep-deprived. She graduated with another woman as the fourth and fifth female Rangers in the Army's 249-year history.


Federal Cuts Gut Food Banks as They Face Record Demand

Food bank shortages caused by high demand and cuts to federal aid programs have some residents of a small community that straddles Idaho and Nevada growing their own food to get by.

For those living in Duck Valley, a reservation of about 1,000 people that is <u>home to the Shoshone-Paiute Tribes</u>, there's just one grocery store where prices are too high for many to afford, said Brandy Bull Chief, local director of a federal food distribution program for tribes. The next-closest grocery stores are more than 100 miles away in Mountain Home, Idaho, and Elko, Nevada. And the local food bank's troubles are mirrored by many nationwide, squeezed between growing need and shrinking aid.

Mobility's Employer Commuter Program is partnering with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC), 511, and Amazon to feature:


- Bay Area Bike Challenge Kick Off on May 1

The Greater Vallejo Recreation District (GVRD) is an independent special district, a separate government agency from the City of Vallejo, that provides parks and recreation programs for children, families, and seniors in Vallejo.

GVRD was established on July 14, 1944, and its operations are governed by California's <u>Public Resources Code §5780 et seq.</u>

GVRD operates primarily by means of locally-controlled funding and also receives revenue from fees for services, park entrances, programs, and facility rentals. Grants and park dedication permit fees assist in the provision of new park development projects and ongoing maintenance.

GVRD manages 407 acres of public park space including 20 neighborhood parks, 10 community parks, 6 special-purpose parks, an Olympic-size swimming pool, and 4 community centers. GVRD maintains over 1,000 acres of public land and offers programs that benefit over 120,000 Vallejo residents of all ages each year.





State Route 37/Fairgrounds Drive Interchange - Vallejo Construction Shifts into Gear - May 2025 Watch for Traffic Lane Shifts/Overnight Ramp Closures

From a Solano Transportation Authority press release:

The Solano Transportation Authority (STA), in close coordination with its transportation partner, the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans), has started construction work on the new State Route 37 (SR 37)/Fairgrounds Drive Interchange Project in Vallejo. The interchange improvement project will enhance motorist safety and improve bicycle and pedestrian access with construction of a new divergent diamond interchange. This is the first-ever divergent diamond interchange (DDI) constructed in the Bay Area and only the second-ever constructed on a major highway in California.

What to Expect During Initial Construction Work

Construction at SR 37 and Fairgrounds Drive recently started construction in April 2025. The site is near the Six Flags Discovery Kingdom Theme Park and the Solano County Fairgrounds. Major public impacts to SR 37 and Fairgrounds Drive are scheduled to start in May 2025. In the coming weeks, motorists will begin to see lane traffic shifts, overnight ramp closures, tree removal, signage installation, and various temporary lane closures.

The following construction-related activities are set to happen starting in May 2025.

• Motorists on Fairgrounds Drive at SR 37 should watch for temporary traffic lane shifts.

• Eastbound on and off ramps at SR 37/Fairgrounds Drive will be closed overnight with detours. Closures are scheduled from 10:00 PM until 5:00 AM.

• The westbound off-ramp from SR 37 to Fairgrounds Drive will be

closed nightly from 11:00 PM – 5:00 AM.
The SolTrans bus stop at the on-ramp to Westbound SR 37 will be temporarily relocated a few feet away.

Motorists should drive with caution in construction zones and expect travel delays. All work is weather dependent.



Sea Level Rise Vulnerability Assessment

The Fairfield-Suisun Sewer District recently solicited proposals from consulting firms to conduct a Sea Level Rise Vulnerability Assessment and develop an Adaptation Plan for the Solano Bayshore region.

This important initiative is supported by grants from the Office of Planning and Research and the Ocean Protection Council. The primary objective is to evaluate the potential impacts of sea level rise on critical infrastructure, natural resources, and local communities, and to create a comprehensive plan outlining strategies to reduce and manage these risks. Following interviews with three qualified firms, AECOM (Architecture, Engineering, Construction, Operations & Management) was selected to lead and facilitate the project. As the project progresses, the city of Fairfield will play a supportive role by offering input and assistance to the Fairfield-Suisun Sewer District and other partners.

This collaboration will help ensure that the project goals are achieved and that the resulting strategies align with the city's interests. Ultimately, Fairfield's participation will contribute to shaping an adaptation plan that strengthens community resilience and enhances the region's ability to respond effectively to the challenges posed by sea level rise.

I-80 Vacaville/Fairfield Ramp Repaving and Sidewalk Improvements started



From a Caltrans press release:

Caltrans is starting construction on a major new project on I-80 in Solano County.

The work will repave and enhance all the onramp and exit ramps on eastbound

and westbound I-80 between Vacaville and Fairfield. This includes 14 ramps on the main route between the Bay Area and Sacramento.

The work will also upgrade several sidewalks near these onramps and exit ramps to meet current Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards.

Construction is scheduled to start Monday, April 28 and be tentatively completed by Summer 2026.

For worker and public safety, during construction, Caltrans will need to alternate overnight onramp and exit ramp closures.

Starting the week of Monday, April 28, until further notice, Caltrans will begin work by scheduling overnight closures of the eastbound and westbound I-80 Leisure Town Road onramp and exit ramps. The closures of these ramps are scheduled from 8:00 PM until 4:00 AM the following mornings Monday through Fridays.

During the overnight ramp closures, motorists should be aware, expect delays and watch for various detour signs directing them in the immediate area.

As work at I-80 and Leisure Town Road is completed, Caltrans will begin work on the other I-80 on-ramp and exit ramps starting at Leisure Town in Vacaville and progressing, ramp by ramp from Vacaville westward towards Fairfield. Work and corresponding overnight closures will include the following ramps listed below. Work on each ramp will take approximately 2 weeks. Caltrans will make announcements as soon as new information is available.

- East Monte Vista Avenue
- Alamo Drive
- Allison Drive

Fairfield Onramps and I-80 Exit Ramps

Despite a chilly morning with cloud cover and scattered rain, 212 dedicated volunteers came together across Solano County to make a significant difference at the annual Earth Day Cleanup.

Volunteers spanned 11 sites and covered 8 miles across the county, working tirelessly to remove 3,603 pounds of trash and another 135 pounds of recyclables. This year marks the 11th anniversary of the county-wide event and brings the total amount of trash and recyclables collected over the years to a remarkable 63,381 pounds.

The cleanup effort showcased the multiplying effect of community collaboration. Marianne Butler, Solano RCD Education Director, noted the inspiring scene: "Downtown Vacaville's Earth Day cleanup was made powerful by the collective effort of groups from the Academy of the 21st Century Learning, Target, Amazon, and many others." She related witnessing the immediate impact when Gabe A., a young man born and raised in Vacaville, saw the volunteers on the Ulatis Creek bank and didn't hesitate to put down his coffee, register, and join them, sharing that he'd been waiting for this chance. "That's the true spirit of Earth Day," Ms. Butler said. "Let's make more of these moments happen, together."

Emma Mendiola hosted the Vacaville site and has been the site captain for over a decade. This year, as in years past, she handed out Lara bars to all participants, with thanks to the Sierra Club of Solano County and Sprouts Farmers Market for making them available.

Jose, a Vallejo resident, waded right in to collect trash in a storm drain outfall. He has previously volunteered for cleanup events in Solano County (as evidenced by a Coastal Cleanup Day shirt) and was glad to participate again for this year's Earth Day event. He was happy to utilize a burlap sack from Moschetti Artisan Coffee Roaster in Vallejo for his collection, who donates the sacks to help minimize waste from the event.

The event drew volunteers with a variety of motivations. Marsha, an enthusiastic volunteer at the Grizzly Island Road site hosted by Solano Land Trust, even makes her own trash pick-up sticks to use. She shared, "I have wanted to do a clean-up with a team or group! I was always so busy, was never able to do it and usually clean up when I go fishing. I have never joined an Earth Day team or event before!"

Jane S., a volunteer at the Industrial Pond site in Dixon, expressed her commitment to the community, stating, "I love being able to help my community be a cleaner and healthier place."

Common finds during the cleanup included discarded recyclable glass and aluminum beverage containers, food wrappers, cigarette butts, and single-use plastics.

The Earth Day Cleanup is one of three annual county-wide cleanup efforts coordinated by Solano County agencies and cities in partnership with Solano Resource Conservation District. Having consistent annual events like the Earth Day Cleanup is important as these ongoing efforts provide opportunities for each generation to contribute to a cleaner environment, ensuring that trash is removed before it can pollute local waterways and ultimately reach the ocean.

People who missed this opportunity or who loved it and want to come back for more can join us at Lake Solano for World Environment Day taking place on June 7th. The family-friendly event not only focuses on cleaning up the shoreline of a major water source for our county, Lake Berryessa, but also includes fun activities for volunteers such as planting grass plugs and forbs and making seed packets to attract pollinators to their gardens. Lunch and cold drinks will be available to all registered volunteers, who will also receive a commemorative t-shirt. In addition, there will be guided kayak tours of Lake Solano and the opportunity to meet Bilgee the Bilge Pad, the protector of Lake Berryessa, who will encourage volunteers and pose for pictures. 



New Traffic Pattern for Southbound West 7th Street Traffic at Military West



From the city of Benicia:

On Monday, April 21 there will be a new traffic pattern for southbound traffic on West 7th Street at Military West. Vehicles traveling southbound on West 7th Street will be able to turn left (eastbound) onto Military West from either the right or left lane. Thru traffic on West 7th Street will now be from the right lane. Vehicles must be in the right lane to continue onto West 7th Street and to access the businesses on the south side of the intersection. Line extensions (dashed white lines) will be added in the intersection to guide the left turning traffic. Do not cross these dashed lines within the intersection.

Please use caution and slow down when navigating this intersection. The purpose of these improvements is to increase southbound vehicle volume, thus reducing phase durations and wait times at this traffic signal.



Bay Area Butterfly Festival

Monarch butterflies play a crucial role in regulating our ecosystems and pollinating plants — including the crops we rely on for food. One out of every three bites of food we eat is thanks to pollinators like the Monarch butterfly. Without pollinators, our entire food web could unravel.

After two years of counts averaging 116,000 Western Monarch butterflies, only 5,407 of these orange-and-black beauties were counted in their winter groves during the most recent winter. (Data from Xerces Society.) This population count shows a heartbreaking decline of 95% for Monarchs, who are dying off due to pesticides and habitat loss.

You can learn more about Monarchs and how to support them at the Bay Area Butterfly Festival on **Sunday**, **June 1 at the Mare Island Promenade in Vallejo from 10 a.m. - 5 p.m.** There will be fun for the entire family, with interactive stations, presentations, music, vendors, arts and crafts, food & drinks, and more!

The festival is a low-to-no-waste event and will highlight the importance of sustainability.
